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ABSTRACT

The guide is designed to provide the user with complete information regarding the operation of the general education (GED) testing program on a State by State basis. Information regarding requirements for issuance of credentials, minimum age for testing, requirements for retesting, method of applying, official transcripts, fees, the name and address of each State administrator, along with a full listing of official GED centers and chief examiners for each State and territory is provided alphabetically by State. The provinces of Canada, military centers, and Veterans Administration hospitals and centers are also included. (LH)

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Preface

This publication, The GED Testing Program: Policies and Centers combines two formerly separate publications: Official GED Centers and Bulletin No. 5, Policies of State-Level Departments of Education. The book is designed to provide the user with reference to the operation of the GED Testing Program on a state-by-state basis—requirements for issuance of credentials, minimum age for testing, requirements for retesting, method of applying, official transcripts, fees. The name and address of each state administrator is provided, along with a full listing of Official GED Centers and chief examiners for each state, territory, and province.

The GED Testing Program is now administered in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, U.S. territories, and the Canadian provinces and territories. Editions of the Tests are available in English, French, and Spanish.

The state-level departments of education and the GED Testing Service of the American Council on Education are jointly responsible for the operation and security of the GED Testing Program. The Tests are administered to qualified persons at approximately 2,500 Official GED Centers approved by the state-level departments of education. The credentials issued by state-level departments of education are official documents that are accep-

table in the same manner as high school graduation diplomas.

Policies of State-Level Departments of Education (Bulletin No. 5), prior to the 1975 edition, contained policies of state departments of education under which local high schools are authorized to grant credit toward a high school diploma for various educational experiences acquired by active-duty military training or educational experiences: (1) United States Armed Forces Institute courses; (2) United States Armed Forces Institute subjective examinations; (3) high school courses offered through USAFI by cooperating colleges and universities; (4) Marine Corps Institute courses; (5) Coast Guard Institute courses; (6) basic or recruit training; and (7) service school training. The specific recommendations and credit allowances are contained in the eleventh edition (1972) of Bulletin No. 5 or may be obtained from the appropriate state departments of education, or the GED Testing Service of the American Council on Education.

The policies contained in the bulletin have been approved for publication by the respective departments of education and are the policies effective in late 1975. Changes in policies and State Administrator positions will

be announced in the OEC Newsletter.

The staff of the GED Testing Service and the Office on Educational Credit gratefully acknowledge the cooperation and assistance of the departments of education, particularly the State Administrators, in the preparation of this publication.

ALABAMA State Department of Education

- 1. Title of State Credential: State Certificate of High School Equivalency.
- 2. Requirements for Issuance of Certificate:
 - a. Minimum test scores: A standard score of 35 on each of the five tests or an average standard score of 45 on all five tests.
 - b. Minimum age: 18. Applicant may not be enrolled in regular secondary day school. Applicant 17 years of age may take the test if one of the following conditions is met: (1) must have been withdrawn from school for a period of one year, (2) must be married, or (3) must be supporting someone other than self, and must be recommended by the superintendent (or his designee) of the last school attended, on form E-2 submitted with application.
 - c. Residence: Applicant must meet residency requirement in one of the following ways: (1) has resided in Alabama for at least 30 days immediately preceding date of certificate, (2) has attended school for at least one year in Alabama, or (3) is a qualified voter in Alabama as verified by a statement from the Board of Registrars.
- 3. Minimum Age for Testing: Same as 2-b.
- 4. Requirements for Retesting: Examinee must wait six months unless intensive study for six weeks has been accomplished. This must be substantiated by letter from a competent person who has knowledge of applicant's study.
- 5. Method of Applying: Application must be on prescribed Form E-7, obtainable only after receipt of report of GED test scores by State Department of Education.
- 6. Official Transcripts: Test scores are accepted as official only when reported directly by: (1) Official GED Centers; (2) Transcript Service of the Defense Activity for Non-Traditional Education Support; (3) Veterans Administration hospitals and centers; and (4) the GED Testing Service.
- 7. Fee:
 - a. Testing at Official GED Centers: \$10.00 per battery; \$2.50 per retest on each part.
 - b. Issuance of certificate: No charge. Each duplicate certificate: \$2.00.

- 1. T tle of State Credential: State of Alaska High School Diploma.
- 2. Requirements for Issuance of Diploma:
 - a. Minimum: test scores: A standard score of 35 on each test or an average standard score of 45 on all five tests.
 - b. Minimum age: Applicants are eligible six months following the date they would normally have graduated, that is, four years following enrollment



- in the 9th grade, or following their 18th birthday, whichever is sconer.
- c. Residence: Applicants must reside in the state 30 days preceding application.
- 3. Minimum Age for Testing: Same as 2b, except applicants may be tested at discretion of chief examiners of Official GED Centers before they meet requirements in 2-b; applicants for induction into the Armed Forces may be tested if they have reached their 17th birthday, provided the chief examiner of an Official GED Center receives a letter from the recruiting officer for each applicant to take the GED tests, stating that the applicant meets all the militry requirements for induction except achieving the above scores on the GED tests.
- 4. Requirements for Retesting: Retesting may be authorized after completion of intensive instruction or independent study in the area of failure or after a period of six months has elapsed between testing if additional instruction or independent study has not been completed.

5. Method of Applying:

- a. Application must be on prescribed form obtainable from the State Department of Education or an Official GED Center in Alaska.
- b. Application must accompany test scores to State Department of Education.
- 6. Official Transcripts: Test scores are accepted as official only when reported directly by: (1) Official GED Centers; (2) Transcript Service of the Defense Activity for Non-Traditional Education Support; (3) Veterans Administration hospitals and centers; and (4) the GED Testing Service.

- a. Testing at Official GED Centers: Varies.
- b. Issuance of diploma: No charge.

ARIZONA Department of Education

- 1. Title of State Credential: Arizona High School Certificate of Equivalency.
- 2. Requirements for Issuance of Diploma:
 - a. Minimum test scores: A standard score of 35 on each of the five tests and an average standard score of 45 on all five tests (total 225 points).
 - b. Minimum age: 19.
 - c. Residence: Applicant must be physically present to take the GED test in Arizona. Military personnel and veterans who were tested through the United States Armed Forces Institute (USAFI), now DANTES, are eligible to apply for an Arizona Certificate if they were tested while stationed in Arizona, attended school in Arizona, or are residents of Arizona. These rules also apply to military personnel, veterans, and civilians who were or are being tested through the Washington, D.C. GED Testing Service. Results will be accepted from out-of-state Official GED Centers and a certificate issued only if the last civilian school of attendance was in Arizona and all requirements are met.
- 3. Minimum Age for Testing: Individuals 17 and 18 years of age are eligible for testing for the following reasons if appropriate requirements are met:
 - (1) For employment, candidate must (a) have been out of school 12 months, (b) present a letter of recommendation from a responsible individual, (c) present a letter of parental or guardian approval (approval not required at 18), and (d) present a statement of request from a prospective or present employer.
 - (2) For college or university admission, trade schools, licensing agencies, etc., candidate must (a) have been out of school 12 months or present a letter of recommendation from the principal and counselor of the last school attended, (b) present a letter of recommendation from a responsible individual, (c) present a letter of parental or guardian approval (not required at 18), and (d) present a letter of conditional acceptance from the respective school or agency for a 9th, 10th, 11th, or 12th grade level of achievement.
 - (3) For entrance into the Armed Forces, (a) the chief examiner of an Official GED Center must receive a request in the form of a letter from a recruiting officer for each applicant asking admission of the applicant, and stating that the applicant meets all of the military requirements for induction, except for achieving satisfactory scores on the GED Test, (b) the recruiting officer must provide to the chief examiner a copy of a letter from the applicant's parent or guardian granting permission to enter the Armed Forces, and (c) in cases of 17-year-olds who have dropped out of school during the past year, the recruiting officer will provide to the chief examiner a letter from the applicant's former high school principal stating that the applicant has left school.
 - (Scores will be forwarded as appropriate to employer, school or agency, or recruiting official, but examinee may not receive certificate until age 19 when all state requirements are met.)
- 4. Requirements for Retesting: 30 days after initial testing, an individual may retake any one or all tests to meet minimum standard GED scores for the grade level of equivalency desired. One retest is allowed for each test, provided applicant produces written evidence of additional tutoring or study. If the desired standards are not met on the retest, the candidate must take the entire battery after completion of an approved course of study and must



present written evidence from a qualified instructor attesting to the applicant's readiness to pass the test. If all tests are not completed within 12 months of initial testing, all tests must be repeated and the initial fee paid again. It is recommended that the candidate take all tests at the same testing center.

Method of Applying: Applicants who have taken GED Tests through USAFI (DANTES) and who meet all requirements should request a military application card from the Department of Education. The application must also be verified and signed by an education officer or advisor. The completed application card must be sent to DANTES, 2318 South Park, Madison, Wisconsin 53713 with a request that the official GED transcript and application card be sent directly to the Arizona Department, of Education.

Applicants who have taken GED tests through the GED Testing Service and meet all requirements must request a civilian application card from the Department of Education. The front side of the application must be completed by the applicant. - b. Minimum age: Applicants shall have attained the age at which, had they remained in school, they would have graduated at least one year prior to date of application.
- c. Residence: Not required.

An approval for waiver of minimum age for GED tests, Form F41-119a, is sent to the recruiting officer, who will deliver it to the candidate, who will present it to the Official GED Center. Minimum standard scores are required to receive the equivalency certificate.

Requirements for Retesting: A candidate who fails to attain the passing mark on first trial may stand the examination a second time as early as it is offered, but six months must elapse after a second trial before a third trial, and between subsequent trials, unless the applicant presents written evidence with signed approval of a high school principal or authorized adult education coordinator that educational courses have been completed to improve skills since the date of last examination. All repeat candidates must retake the entire examination battery, except the following: A candidate who on the first trial attains a total score between 175 and 179 or who attains scores of 45 or higher on three tests, will be permitted a limited privilege of retaking the one test on which he made the lowest score. Such candidate may take this one test a second time as early as it is offered, and again six months after the second trial. This is the only circumstance in which part scores from several examinations can be combined. Should such candidate desire a fourth trial, he must repeat the entire examination. (Fee must be paid for each repeat examination.)
