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ABSTRACT The guide presents an overview of the textual and microfilmed records located at the Seattle Branch of the National Archives of the United States. Established in 1969, the Seattle Archives Branch is one of 11 branches which preserve and make available for research those U.S. Government records of permanent value created and maintained by Federal agencies. The Seattle Branch serves the states of Alaska, Idaho, Oregon, and Washington. The textual and microfilmed records identified in this guide contain basic documentation for the study of subjects such as history, economics, public administration, political science, law, ethnology, and genealogy. Records are listed according to six categories: U.S. Government--General, Legislative Branch, Judicial Branch, Executive Branch, Records of or Relating to Other Governments, and Other Holdings. Executive Branch holdings comprise the bulk of the guide. They include records from the Departments of State, Treasury, Defense, Justice, Interior, Commerce, Labor, and Transportation. Information is given concerning limited loan arrangements. The guide can serve as a model for others who want to develop a handbook of their holdings. (Author/AV)

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ARCHIVES BRANCH

SEATTLE FEDERAL ARCHIVES AND RECORDS CENTER

GENERAL

The National Archives of the United States is that body of records that documents American history from the First Continental Congress and includes the permanently valuable records of the three branches of the Federal Government. The archives are preserved and made available because of their continuing value to government operation; to protect both public and private rights; and for research use by scholars, students, and the general public.

The General Services Administration, through the National Archives and Records Service (NARS), operates a nationwide system of depositories that contains segments of the National Archives of the United States. Included are the National Archives Building in Washington, D.C., the six Presidential Libraries, and fifteen Federal Records Centers, eleven of which include archives branches. The eleven regional archives branches, established in 1969, generally preserve and make available for research those U. S. Government records of permanent value created and maintained by field offices of Federal agencies. (See Appendix A for a list of the regional archives and the areas they serve.) In addition to accessioning textual records, regional archives branches have begun to acquire copies of many of the NARS microfilm publications. Seattle Archives Branch holdings also include microfiche, filmstrips, sound recordings, and videotapes.

The Archives Branch in the Seattle Federal Archives and Records Center has a research room, microfilm reading equipment, document reproduction facilities, and a small reference library. The library includes various NARS publications: bulletins, conference materials, inventories, and special guides to particular areas, periods, or subjects. Other reference aids provide resource material on genealogy, Indian affairs, the Bicentennial, forestry and conservation, the Pacific Northwest, Alaska, archives administration, Presidential Libraries, and other topics. Also in the library are ninety preliminary reports prepared by and for the Public Land Law Review Commission from 1968 to 1970. These relate to all aspects of public land law requirements and contain data on resources, economics, and fiscal matters.

This guide presents only a general view of the textual records and microfilmed records available at the Seattle Archives Branch. The task of analyzing, arranging, describing, and otherwise establishing completely adequate control over all the records described here is still unfinished. The description of records, therefore, is necessarily provisional.

The unit of entry in this guide is the "Record Group," following the pattern of the NARS Guide to the National Archives of the United States. The term "Record Group," which is followed by a number and appears after the name of a federal agency or records creator, refers to a system of administrative control used by NARS for the records in its custody. (See Appendix E for a Glossary of basic archival terms used in this guide.) The arrangement of descriptions of microfilmed records and textual records together, according to record groups, reflects the organic relationship between federal agency headquarters' records, which have been deposited in the National Archives in Washington, D.C. (microfilmed copies of which are sent to the regional archives branches) and textual records of their field offices in the Pacific Northwest which have been deposited in the Seattle Archives Branch. For a list of record groups arranged by record group number see Appendix B.

The Seattle Federal Archives and Records Center is located about two miles northeast of the University of Washington, at 6125 Sand Point Way NE, Seattle, Washington 98115. Research facilities are open to the public Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., except federal holidays. Phone: 206-442-4500 (FTS 399-4500).

TEXTUAL RECORDS

The records described in this guide are those accessioned into the legal custody of the National Archives of the United States and are in the physical custody of the Seattle Archives Branch. Textual record holdings presently total almost 14,000 cubic feet (approximately 460 cubic meters) and date from 1841 to the 1950's. This represents a tiny fraction (about 5%) of the total volume of records (300,000 cubic feet) now stored in the Federal Archives and Records Center in Seattle. Most of these are disposable administrative (housekeeping) records of no historical value.

Archival records in the Seattle Center originated in Federal Government field offices located in Alaska, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, and Washington. As noted above, these regional records complement agency headquarters records deposited in the National Archives in Washington, D.C. Dates indicated are generally those of the oldest and most recent documents included in the records.

Recently deposited noncurrent records in the Center also may be of permanent, historical value. However, these have not been accessioned into the Archives and are presently in the legal custody of the originating agency. Before a researcher may use them, the agency will have to grant permission under the provisions of the Freedom of Information Act and the Privacy Act of 1974. The Center can refer patrons to the appropriate agency records officer.

Textual records may be used only in our search room. They are not available for interinstitutional loan, except by permission of the Archivist of the United States.

MICROFILMED RECORDS

In addition to the textual records created by Federal agencies in the Pacific Northwest, the Archives Branch also receives and purchases microfilm publications of the National Archives and Records Service. These publications, on 35- and 16-mm. microfilm reels, reproduce with introductions and annotations some of the most significant records in the National Archives Building. They contain basic documentation for the study of history, economics, public administration, political science, law, ethnology, genealogy, and other subjects.

All microfilm publications listed on the following pages, except the 1900 Census and the 1900 Soundex, may be borrowed on interinstitutional loan for use in your local library, or you may use the microfilm in our search room. Details concerning interinstitutional loan procedures may be found on page 5. Please remember that only the regional archives branches have microfilm which is available for loan. The National Archives in Washington, D.C. does not loan microfilm or original records.

This guide includes all microfilm held by the Seattle Archives Branch. NARS official publications carry "M" or "T" numbers. Usually, each "M" publication reproduces an entire series of records and has an introduction describing the origin, content, and arrangement of the records filmed. Descriptive pamphlets are available for most "M" publications. The pamphlet contains the publication's introduction and a roll-by-roll breakdown of the records filmed. Copies of the pamphlets are available through the Seattle Archives Branch. An unofficial microfilm publication, MR3, "Microfilm Publications Descriptive Pamphlets," reproduces those pamphlets available in the Seattle Archives Branch as of 1973. Additional pamphlets have been received by the Branch but have not been filmed.

"T" publications supplement "M" publications. They are not usually a reproduction of a complete series of records but may be a segment, by date or subject, of a larger series. In many cases "T" publications were filmed as a result of a special reference request. These publications contain no introductions, nor are pamphlets available for them, but they do have roll lists. "M" and "T" publications may be purchased from the Publications Sales Branch, National Archives and Records Service, Washington, D.C. 20408.

For a description of National Archives and Records Service microfilm publications available in Washington, D.C. see Catalogue of National Archives Microfilm Publications, 1974. In this edition only Record Group 59, General Records of the Department of State, has roll-by-roll descriptions.

Two other useful catalogues should be mentioned: Federal Population Censuses, 1790-1890: A Catalogue of Microfilm Copies of the Schedules (Washington, D.C.: NARS, 1977), which gives a roll-by-roll breakdown of the

Federal populations schedules; and The American Indian: A Select Catalog of National Archives Microfilm Publications (Washington, D.C.: NARS, 1972).

Information on additional publications distributed after June 30, 1975, is published periodically in Prologue: The Journal of the National Archives. Titles of post-1974 microfilm publications may also be obtained by directing inquiries to the Publications Sales Branch, National Archives and Records Service, Washington, D.C. 20408.

Some of our microfilms are not official NARS publications. These items, carrying "I" numbers, have been acquired by the Seattle Branch through other means to assist researchers in this region. They are available for interinstitutional loan or use in our search room, but reproduction may be restricted by copyright or other legal agreements. Inquiries about these microfilms should be addressed to: Chief, Archives Branch, Federal Archives and Records Center, 6125 Sand Point Way, NE, Seattle, Washington 98115.

To locate microfilm publications in this guide by record group consult either the table of Contents, or Appendix B: List of Record Groups Arranged by Record Group Number.

To locate microfilm publications by date span of the records see Appendix C: Chronological List of Microfilm. This list includes the record group number to which the microfilm belongs and the page where the microfilm can be found in the Guide.

To locate microfilm publications by "M," "T," "I," or "P" number see Appendix D: Numerical List of Microfilm. This list includes the record group number to which the microfilm belongs and the page where the microfilm can be found in the Guide.

Appendix F lists NARS microfilm publications received after the Guide had been proofread and sent to press. Those microfilms are incorporated in both Appendix C (Chronological List of Microfilm) and Appendix D (Numerical List of Microfilm). As additional microfilm publications are received, they will be listed in Appendix F.

INSTRUCTIONS GOVERNING THE LOAN OF MICROFILM PUBLICATIONS

I. - General

- A. NARS microfilm publications deposited in regional Archives Branches are loaned in general accordance with the American Library Association's "National Interlibrary Loan Code, 1968."
- B. Only microfilm described on the following pages is available for loan. Additional titles found in the catalogue in item A can be purchased from NARS Publications Sales Branch in Washington, D.C.
- C. Microfilm held in common by all Archives Branches is available for loan from the Seattle Branch only within the region that it serves.
- D. The Seattle Archives Branch regional loan area is Alaska, Idaho, Oregon, and Washington, and the Canadian Provinces of Alberta, British Columbia, and the Yukon Territory.
- E. Unique microfilm titles are available for interregional loan.

II. Loan Requests

- A. A maximum of four rolls will be loaned for a specific user for a period of 21 days, including transit time. Loans may be renewed for an additional 21 days upon request.
- B. Request NARS microfilm publications on the "Interlibrary Loan Request" form as prescribed by the ALA Code using the following instructions:
 1. Show the NARS "M" or "T" number in the "Call No." box and the roll number wanted in the "Author" space on the ILL form (see List). If "M" or "T" number and/or roll numbers are not known, explain as fully as possible the material wanted, including dates, in the "Title" space on the ILL form.
 2. Always complete the "For Use Of" and "Status" space on the ILL form and include in the "Borrowing Library" address box the library's area code and telephone number.
 3. Microfilm numbers or titles not appearing on the following pages are not on deposit here and are not available for loan.

III. Borrowing Institution's Responsibilities

- A. The microfilm is loaned only to an institution, must not be removed from the institution, and must be used on clean microfilm reading equipment.
- B. The borrowing institution must ~~pay return postage~~ and properly package the microfilm so it will not be damaged in transit. Proper packaging means enclosing the NARS storage boxes in RIGID cardboard, not a padded mailing bag.
- C. The borrowing institution is responsible for replacing rolls of microfilm damaged or lost while on loan. The replacement price will be the regular purchase price charged by the National Archives.

MICROFILMED RECORDS

M247, Papers of the Continental Congress, 1774-1789. 204 rolls.

These records were maintained by Charles Thomson, Secretary of the Congress, and were later arranged in a numerical sequence. They consist of the journals of the Congress; reports of its committees; memorials and petitions; and correspondence of its presidents and other officers with diplomatic representatives of the United States abroad, officers in the Continental Army, State officials, and private persons.

M332, Miscellaneous Papers of the Continental Congress, 1774-1789. 9 rolls.

These records are not a part of the numbered sequence of Continental Congress papers reproduced in M247. They include despatches and letters, reports of committees, bonds, receipts, deeds of cession of western lands, credentials of Delegates to the Congress, and broadsides issued by the Congress.

T408, Credentials of Delegates From Virginia to the Continental Congress, 1775-1788. 1 roll.

Proceedings and resolutions of the House of Burgesses of the Colony of Virginia, and of the Senate and House of Delegates of the State of Virginia, relating to the selection of Delegates to the Continental and Confederation Congresses, and copies of credentials provided to those Delegates.

M866, Records of the Constitutional Convention of 1787. 1 roll.

Official records include 4 volumes of journals and drafts of the Virginia Plan. Also on this reel are credentials of the delegates; papers of David Brearley, Chief Justice of New Jersey; and a motion by Elbridge Gerry concerning election of the "Supreme Executive."

T409, Marine Committee Letterbook, 1776-1780. 1 roll.

The index gives the name of each seaman, his rank, and the unit in which he served.

M246, Revolutionary War Rolls, 1775-1783. 138 rolls.

This microfilm publication includes muster rolls, payrolls, returns of company regimental personnel, lists of officers, guard reports, and other records related to military service. The material is arranged in three parts as follows: records of State organizations, records of Continental troops, and miscellaneous returns and records. See also Records of the Continental and Confederation Congresses and the Constitutional Convention, Record Group 360; Records of the Supreme Court of the United States, Record Group 267; and Records of the Adjutant General's Office, 1780's-1917, Record Group 94.

This microfilm publication is divided into three segments: ratified Indian treaties and related papers, a chronological list of the treaties, and indexes by place and tribe. See also Records of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Record Group 75.

M337, Enrolled Original Acts and Resolutions of the Congress of the United States, 1789-1923. 17 rolls.

Original and joint resolutions of the United States signed by the Speaker of the House, the President of the Senate, and the President of the United States. These are engrossed on parchment sheets of varying size.

M338, Certificates of Ratification of the Constitution and the Bill of Rights, Including Related Correspondence and Rejections of Proposed Amendments, 1787-1792. 1 roll.

Records include Washington's annotated draft of the Constitution, certificates of ratification by the States, copies of letters concerning ratification of amendments, and certificates of ratification and rejection of proposed constitutional amendments.

These papers were created as a result of the constitutional prerogatives of the Congress over Territories, its power to admit new States, its control of appropriations, and the right of the people to petition the Congress for a redress of grievances. In the main they consist of petitions, memorials, bills, resolutions, reports from executive departments, and correspondence. See also General Records of the Department of State, Record Group 59; Records of the Office of the Secretary of the Interior, Record Group 48; and The Territorial Papers of the United States, listed on page 80.

Shown are the number of the report, in whose name the audit is registered, the date of Comptroller's admission, and the nature and purpose of the account, such as payments to invalid pensioners.

T135, Selected Records of the General Accounting Office Relating to Fremont Expeditions and the California Battalion, 1842-1890. 3 rolls.

Include claims and acknowledgments of payments, 1842-45, for the first expedition; quarterly abstracts of disbursements, 1843-45; accounts and payments, 1845-49; muster rolls and payrolls of the California Battalion, 1846-54; Claims of California volunteers; and papers and accounts of John C. Fremont, 1846-90.

M520, Records of the Board of Commissioners for the Emancipation of Slaves in the District of Columbia, 1862-1863. 6 rolls.

Include minutes of the Board of Commissioners appointed under section 3 of an act of April 16, 1862, abolishing slavery in the District of Columbia; petitions from owners for compensation for the value of the slaves allowed under the acts of April 16 and July 12, 1862; a summary list of the amounts awarded, showing number of petition, name of claimant, number of servants, amount awarded, and signature of claimant; and an unbound final report of the Board to the Secretary of the Treasury, January 14, 1863.

M497, Letters Sent by the Commissioner of Customs Relating to Smuggling, 1865-1869. 1 roll.

Fair copies of letters sent by the Commissioner of Customs: Most of the letters are instructions to Treasury Department special agents and collectors of customs stationed along the Mexican and Canadian borders; they relate to methods of stopping smuggling activities in those areas.

M498, Letters Sent by the Commissioner of Customs Relating to Captured and Abandoned Property, 1868-1875. 1 roll.

Fair copies of letters sent by the Commissioner of Customs to Treasury Department special agents, auditors, and other officials concerning the settlement of accounts relating to captured and abandoned property and restricted commercial intercourse during the Civil War.

MICROFILMED RECORDS

M162, The Revolutionary War Prize Cases: Records of the Court of Appeals in Cases of Capture, 1776-1787. 15 rolls.

These consist of the records of prize cases heard on appeal from colonial and State courts by committees of the Continental Congress, 1776-80, and by the Court of Appeals in Cases of Capture, 1780-86.

M215, Minutes of the Supreme Court of the United States, 1790-1950. 41 rolls.

These engrossed minutes contain a complete report of the daily proceedings of each session of the Supreme Court.

M217, Attorney Rolls of the Supreme Court of the United States, 1790-1951. 4 rolls.

These contain the signatures of attorneys and counselors admitted to practice before the Supreme Court.

M216, Dockets of the Supreme Court of the United States, 1791-1950. 27 rolls.

Included are the engrossed dockets of the Supreme Court, 1791-1905, and the single series of dockets created by the Court since 1905, together with parts of the rough dockets that contain entries for original-jurisdiction cases, 1829-1905. The dockets after May 31, 1905, record all cases that have come before the Court in both original and appellate jurisdictions.

M408, Index to Appellate Case Files of the Supreme Court of the United States, 1792-1909. 20 rolls.

Each index card gives the names of the parties in each case, the file number, the title of the case, the date the case was docketed, and the date a decision was rendered.

M214, Appellate Case Files of the Supreme Court of the United States, 1792-1831. 96 rolls.

These records consist chiefly of transcripts of record of the cases in lower courts. Included are copies of the papers filed and of minute entries of the lower courts' actions in the cases and documents resulting from the proceedings before the Supreme Court.

T57, Original Opinions of the Justices of the Supreme Court of the United States Delivered at January Term 1832 and Opinions and Other Case Papers of Chief Justice Marshall, 1834 and 1835 Terms. 1 roll.

Chiefly manuscript opinions delivered by Chief Justice John Marshall and Justices Joseph Story, Smith Thompson, and John McLean at the 1832 term of the Court and by Marshall at the 1834 and 1835 terms. There are also orders by the Court in certain cases; notes on cases by Justice Henry Baldwin; and a few letters, including two by Marshall dated March 23, 1832, and May 4, 1833.

RECORDS OF DISTRICT COURTS OF THE UNITED STATES

(RECORD GROUP 21)

TEXTUAL RECORDS

Records of District Courts of the United States, 1859-1973. 5769 cf. (192.23 m3) One Draft Preliminary Inventory.

Included in this Record Group are records of U. S. circuit courts and U. S. district courts. Circuit courts in general had jurisdiction over what are today called civil actions. These include land disputes and patent infringement cases. In addition, the circuit courts had appellate powers from the district courts. Circuit courts were abolished by an act approved in 1911, and their records and most of their functions were transferred to the district courts.

District courts had jurisdiction over admiralty, criminal, bankruptcy, and certain civil cases. After 1911 they assumed jurisdiction over the civil cases formerly heard by the circuit courts. Circuit Courts of Appeal, which have no original jurisdiction, assumed the circuit courts' appellate powers.

Each court generated two forms of records: (1) bound volumes reflecting the work of the court, such as dockets, minutes, orders, final records, and indexes, which have generally been retained by the clerks of the courts, and (2) the documents for each individual case -- subpoenas, briefs, pleadings, depositions, et cetera, which have been transferred to the Archives Branch.

The Customs Service, created in July 1789, became part of the Department of the Treasury in September 1789, and became the Bureau of Customs in 1927. Customs collection districts were established in 1789, and the boundaries changed from time to time until 1913, when a single district was established in each state and territory.

In each district was a headquarters port with a customhouse. The collector was responsible for collecting duties, keeping records of and reporting his financial transactions, admeasuring and documenting American merchant vessels, administering the customhouses and lighthouses (until 1852) in his district or region, collecting hospital moneys from seamen and accounting for their stays in marine hospitals, and administering revenue cutters assigned to his district (until 1871). The enforcement of other acts for the protection of American seamen and American and foreign passengers, and the forwarding of basic data on immigration, imports, and exports (until 1923) became his responsibility. Upon occasion the collector acted as the depository of Federal funds and collected taxes for the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

The naval officer, coordinate in rank with the collector, was required to keep separate accounts and copies of all manifests and entries, and to countersign certain of the collector's accounts. The surveyor, under the collector's supervision, kept a daily record of all vessel arrivals and clearances and was assisted by inspectors, weighers, and

gagers in the collection and payment of bounty allowances and fees and the admeasurement of foreign vessels for tonnage duties.

Records of Collectors of Customs, Puget Sound District. Materials include correspondence, journals, and financial records relating to import and entry of merchandise into the U. S., control of the movement of vessels, documentation, measurement, and inspection of vessels, operation of vessels and employment of seamen, enforcement of custom and navigation laws.

The Bureau of the Mint, established in the Department of the Treasury by an act of February 12, 1873, succeeded the Mint of the United States, founded in 1792 at Philadelphia and continued there after the Federal Government moved to Washington, D.C. in 1800. Although the Mint was nominally an independent agency, the Secretary of the Treasury supervised its coinage operations from 1835 to 1873, and after 1857 the Director was required by law to submit his annual report to the Secretary. The Bureau manufactures domestic and foreign coins, acquires metals for coinage, produces medals of a national character, assays, refines, and receives, stores, and sells gold and silver bullion. Until October 9, 1961, the Director administered regulations issued under the Gold Reserve Act of 1934 and those concerning newly mined silver, and collected statistics on U.S. gold and silver production.

The Seattle Archives Branch holds Records of the U.S. Branch Assay Office, Seattle, 1898-1955. Materials include correspondence, assaying records, registers of deposits of gold and silver, and miscellaneous financial records.

The Office of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue was established in the Treasury Department in 1862 to help finance the Civil War. Wartime taxes were gradually abolished or reduced until only taxes on liquor and tobacco existed in 1883. From that time until 1913 the Bureau was chiefly concerned with the collection of taxes on these two commodities, although other tax or regulatory activities were occasionally assigned to it. It enforced the 1894 income tax and collected corporation income taxes after 1909. With the adoption of the 16th amendment in 1913, the collection of income taxes became one of the Bureau's principal functions.

Branch holdings consist of original monthly assessment lists for individuals and corporations in the following areas: District of Montana, 1897-1917; District of Oregon, 1910-1916; and District of Washington, 1909-1917.

These are registers to the letters included in M492.

M493, Registers of Letters Received From the President, Executive Departments, and War Department Bureaus, 1862-1870. 12 rolls.

These are registers to the letters included in M494. The registers show the date the letter was received, the file number, the office from which the letter was sent or to which it was referred; the date of the letter or of the referral, its purport, its disposition, and reference to related records of the Office of the Secretary of War.

M495, Index to Letters Received, 1861-1870. 14 rolls.

The following series of letters are indexed: Letters received, main series, 1861-70; letters received, irregular series, 1861-66; and letters received from the President, executive departments, and War Department bureaus, 1862-70. The index refers to persons and occasionally to offices, titles, and subjects.

M420, Indexes to Letters Sent Relating to Military Affairs, 1871-1889. 12 rolls.

Included are 19 volumes of indexes to letters sent by the Secretary of War relating to military affairs for the period 1871-89. Entries in the indexes are arranged alphabetically and refer to persons, titles, offices, and subjects. Indexes to the letters before 1871 were included in each volume of the letters and not in separate volumes. See M6 for the related letters.

M222, Letters Received, Unregistered Series, 1789-1861. 34 rolls.

These letters received by the Secretary of War, with enclosures, were not registered. They were from officers of subordinate bureaus of the Department of War, Army officers in the field, Governors of States and Territories, civilian agents in the field, Members of Congress, the President, officials of other executive departments, and private persons. They relate to such topics as Indian affairs, fortifications for the defense of the country's coasts and frontiers; military campaigns against the British and the Indians, the construction and opening of military roads, the granting of pensions, and the furnishing of subsistence for armies in the field.

M221, Letters Received, Main Series, 1801-1870. 317 rolls.

These letters relate to all phases of military and civil policy handled by the Secretary's office. See M22 for the related registers, 1800-70, and M495 for indexes, 1861-70.

M492, Letters Received, Irregular Series, 1861-1866. 36 rolls.

Letters received by the Secretary of War that for one reason or another were not filed in the main series (M221) or in the series of letters received from the President, executive departments, and War Department bureaus (M494). These letters were received from officers of subordinate bureaus of the War Department, officials of other executive departments, Army officers in the field, Governors of States and Territories, members of the diplomatic corps, the President, Members of Congress, and private persons. The letters relate to such topics as the conduct of the Civil War, the organization and strength of the Army, the recruiting and raising of volunteers, the procurement of arms and ammunition, Indian affairs, and the assignment and activities of Army personnel. See M491 for the related registers, 1861-66, and M495 for indexes, 1861-66.

M494, Letters Received From the President, Executive Departments, and War Department Bureaus, 1862-1870. 117 rolls.

Included are letters from the President, executive departments, accounting officers of the Treasury Department, and individual War Department bureaus.

M370, Miscellaneous Letters Sent, 1800-1809. 3 rolls.

These letters were sent mainly to civilians, commercial firms, and other nonmilitary officials or organizations. They relate to a wide variety of subjects but especially to the manufacture, procurement, transportation, and disposition of ordnance and ordnance stores, rations, clothing, and other supplies and equipment. Among the other subjects are claims for lands based on military service, the fortifications of harbors, the erection of buildings at posts and arsenals, and the activities of the State militia.

M6, Letters Sent Relating to Military Affairs, 1800-1889. 110 rolls.

Copies of letters sent by the Secretary of War to chiefs of bureaus of the War Department, officials of other departments, Governors of States and Territories, Army officers, and others relating to military affairs, pension and bounty lands, Indian affairs, and other matters within the jurisdiction of the Secretary of War.

M127, Letters Sent to the President, 1800-1863. 6 rolls.

The letters deal with such subjects as operations of the Army, administration of the War Department, appropriations, military commissions, military posts and establishments, general courts-martial, and annual reports of the Secretary of War.

M7, Confidential and Unofficial Letters Sent, 1814-1847. 2 rolls.

Two volumes of confidential and unofficial letters sent by the Secretary of War or his chief clerk. They consist of fair copies of communications considered distinct from the normal correspondence of the office.

M421, Letters Sent to the President and Executive Departments, 1863-1870. 5 rolls.

Ten volumes of record copies of letters sent by the Secretary of War to the President, to other executive departments, and to bureaus of the War Department. There is a name and a partial subject index to each volume.

This microfilm publication reproduces a seven-volume compilation of copies of official records, State papers, and historical extracts relating to the military status and service of blacks from the Colonial period through 1886, prepared by the Colored Troops Division of the Adjutant General's Office, ca. 1888.

M661, Historical Information Relating to Military Posts and Other Installations, ca. 1700-1900. 8 rolls.

Contains entries for permanent and temporary U.S. Army posts; Confederate forts; fortified Indian towns; harbor pilot stations; national cemeteries; redoubts and batteries; civilian and fur company blockhouses; and British, French, Spanish, and Dutch installations erected within the present boundaries of the United States.

M654, General James Wilkinson's Order Book, December 31, 1796-March 8, 1808. 3 rolls.

The orders relate to a wide variety of subjects, such as the assignment of personnel; the movement, inspection, and muster of troops; the preparation of returns; the issuance and allowance of rations, provisions, and clothing and courts-martial. A name and subject card index to the orders is included.

T36, Lieutenant Zebulon Pike's Notebook of Maps, Traverse Tables, and Meteorological Observations, 1805-1807. 1 roll.

Reproduces Pike's charts, tables, and maps of the Mississippi, Missouri, and Osage Rivers, and of part of the land route traversed by him in 1805-7.

M29, Orders of General Zachary Taylor to the Army of Occupation in the Mexican War, 1845-1847. 3 rolls.

Reproduced are three volumes of the general and special orders issued from August 6, 1845, until November 25, 1847, at the direction of General Zachary Taylor to the Army of Occupation in the Mexican War. Also included are orders issued December 9-30, 1847, by General John E. Wool, who succeeded Taylor in command. The volumes are indexed by name and subject.

Reproduced are three volumes of letter books in which were entered record copies of communications addressed from the

Office of the Chief of Engineers between May 5, 1824, and June 28, 1830, to members of the Corps of Engineers, to the topographical engineers, to the Board of Engineers for Internal Improvements, to the Secretary of War, and to private persons. The letters relate to surveys and reconnaissances directed by the Office of the Chief of Engineers in connection with the program of internal improvements authorized by an act of April 30, 1824. Most of the communications were sent from the Engineer Department and were signed by the Chief of Engineers or by assistants in the Office; a few were sent from the War Department and were signed by the Secretary of War.

M66, Letters Sent by the Topographical Bureau of the War Department and by Successor Divisions in the Office of the Chief of Engineers, 1829-1870. 37 rolls.

Reproduced are record copies of the outgoing correspondence of the Topographical Bureau of the War Department between 1829 and 1863 and of successor divisions in the Office of the Chief of Engineers between 1863 and 1870. The chief concern of the Topographical Bureau was the performance of reconnaissances and surveys relative to internal improvements or to other operations of civil as well as military significance. The letters deal with a wide range of subjects-- river and harbor improvements; canal and railroad routes; international, State, Territorial, and Indian reservation boundaries; the construction of lighthouses; engineering operations in the District of Columbia; and the exploration of the West. Most of the letters are addressed to the topographical engineers, to civil engineers in the Bureau's employ, and to other government officials.

TEXTUAL RECORDS

Records of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, 1858-1945. 541 cf. (18.03 m3) Two Draft Preliminary Inventories:

The military duties of the Engineer districts have included supervision of reconnoitering, surveying, map-making, road building, the laying out of camps, the construction and repair of forts, and the like. Most of the records described here arose out of the civil duties of the districts, which have included the maintenance and improvement of inland waterways and harbors; the formulation and execution of plans for flood control; the operation of dams and locks; the approval of plans for the construction of bridges, wharves, piers, and other works over navigable rivers.

Seattle Branch holdings consist of the following Records of Engineer Divisions and Districts:

Portland District, 1863-1943. 278 cf. Draft Preliminary Inventory.

Records of river and harbor improvements, harbor defenses, 1st Portland District Office, 2nd Portland District Office, and subordinate offices in Bonneville, and Florence, Oregon, and in Fort Canby, Fort Columbia, and Fort Stevens, Washington. Records relate chiefly to planning, construction and administration projects for flood control, river and harbor improvement, and similar civil works projects.

Materials include correspondence, field notebooks, field office files, photographs, and miscellaneous relating to river and harbor improvements, specific projects, floating plant, defense fortifications, Alaska, and fish traps.

These are reproductions of the famous Brady Collection of Civil War photographs, consisting of more than 5,000 glass plate negatives made by or under the directions of Mathew B. Brady and purchased by the Department of War in 1874-75. They include views of the Army in general and historical places, naval scenes, individuals, and groups. There are portraits of Abraham Lincoln, Robert E. Lee, Ulysses S. Grant, Stonewall Jackson, William T. Sherman, and other persons of prominence during the Civil War.

T251, List of Photographs and Photographic Negatives Relating to the War for the Union (War Department Subject Catalog No. 5, 1897). 1 roll.

A list, published by the War Department in 1897, of the Brady collection of Civil War photographs and several other lesser known collections that were at that time in the custody of the War Department Library. It serves as the finding aid for the photographs reproduced in T252.

The letters pertain to all phases of the Bureau's activities.

M742, Selected Series of Records Issued by the Commissioner of the Bureau of Refugees, Freedmen, and Abandoned Lands, 1865-1872. 7 rolls.

Records relating to the general operations of the Freedmen's Bureau. Includes seven volumes of letters sent that also contain copies of O. O. Howard's annual reports to the President, six volumes of endorsements sent, a volume of circulars issued that contain instructions relating to the organization and operation of the Bureau, and a volume of special orders that relate mainly to personnel.

M798, Records of the Assistant Commissioner for the State of Georgia, Bureau of Refugees, Freedmen, and Abandoned Lands, 1865-1869. 36 rolls.

Communications sent, registers of letters received, orders issued, letters and reports received, and miscellaneous papers. Among the reports and miscellaneous papers are reports concerning the Bureau's operations in Georgia, reports of murders and outrages, a register of land titles issued to freedmen, and a listing of civilian agents on duty in Georgia.

M799, Records of the Superintendent of Education for the State of Georgia, Bureau of Refugees, Freedmen, and Abandoned Lands, 1865-1870. 28 rolls.

Included are six volumes of letters sent, five volumes of registers of letters received, letters received, school reports, and accounting records. The monthly school reports include reports from Bureau officers (agents and subassistant commissioners stationed in the subdistricts) and reports from the teachers of freedmen's schools. The accounting records include two registers of expenditures and one volume of miscellaneous lists and memorandums.

The records of the American Section of the Supreme War Council consist of letters, reports, studies, minutes, cablegrams, charts, maps, pamphlets, and books sent to and received from American, French, British, and Italian sources. Although most of the records cover the period 1917-19, a few are dated as early as 1914. In general, they reflect the role of the American Section in collecting and analyzing data to support the Supreme War Council's work in coordinating the Allied war effort in 1918, in implementing the terms of the Armistice, and in drafting the peace treaties in 1919. Because the American Section maintained only one main series of records, the files here reproduced also include much information on the internal organization and operations of the Section.

M88, Records Relating to the United States Surveying Expedition to the North Pacific Ocean, 1852-1863. 27 rolls.

An act of August 31, 1852, appropriated funds for a naval expedition to survey "for naval and commercial purposes. . . the North Pacific Ocean and the China Seas. . . frequented by American whaleships and by trading vessels in the routes between the United States and China." The five vessels comprising the expedition left Hampton Roads on June 11, 1853; the actual work of survey and reconnaissance of the Northern Pacific-Bering Straits area took place between September 1854 and October 1855. The records include letters received by the Secretary of the Navy from the commanders of the expedition, deck logs of the vessels of the expedition, journals kept by officers and civilian employees, orders and instructions issued to the expedition, and letter books of the Office of the U. S. Surveying Expedition, an office created after the return of the expedition to prepare charts and reports for publication.

M89, Letters Received by the Secretary of the Navy From Commanding Officers of Squadrons ("Squadron Letters"), 1841-1886. 300 rolls.

Reproduced are 307 volumes of letters, with their enclosures, received by the Secretary of the Navy from commanding officers of various naval squadrons from February 16, 1841, to November 11, 1886. The letters relate to such topics as Army and Navy operations in the Mexican and Civil Wars, ship accidents, negotiation of treaties, courts-martial, observations of military and naval institutions and affairs in foreign countries, appointments and other personnel matters, and experimental and technical information.

The records consist of letters received by the Navy Department relating to preparations for the expedition, letters received by the Navy Department relating to the expedition itself, 23 journals or logs of the expedition, and records of courts-martial held in the cases of certain officers of the expedition. The volumes are from Naval Records Collection of the Office of Naval Records

and Library, Record Group 45; Records of the Bureau of Naval Personnel, Record Group 24; Records of the Hydrographic Office, Record Group 37; and Records of the Office of the Judge Advocate General (Navy), Record Group 125.

The Department of the Navy, soon after its beginning in 1798, created navy yards and other fleet service shore establishments. A system of naval districts for the United States, its territories and possessions, however, was not formally established until 1903 under the Bureau of Navigation, and the Chief of Naval Operations in 1915 assumed supervision over the system. The districts assumed greater responsibility during World War I, and by the end of World War II they exercised almost complete military and administrative control over naval operations within their limits, including naval shipyards (navy yards), stations, training stations, air installations, and advance bases.

For the records of shore establishments under the jurisdiction of a particular bureau see the record group for that bureau.

Seattle Branch holdings consist of general correspondence of districts and their organizational components for the 13th Naval District, 1901-1956, and the 17th Naval District, 1941-1956.

1904. They are addressed to the President, officers and Members of Congress, Federal departments, judges, district attorneys, marshals, clerks of courts, State officials, and private citizens. Between 1867 and 1874 the establishment of separate series of letter books for specific groups of correspondents led to limiting this series of records to letters sent to private citizens.

M700, Letters Sent by the Department of Justice Concerning Judiciary Expenses, 1849-1884. 24 rolls.

Letter books containing copies of letters sent by the Department of the Interior, 1849-70, and the Department of Justice, 1870-84. The letters concern the administration of the judiciary fund and the supervision of accounts of U.S. attorneys, marshals, clerks, and officers of the courts of the United States.

T969, Letters Sent by the Attorney General, 1851-1871. 6 rolls.

T411, Letters Sent by the Attorney General's Office, 1817-1858. 2 rolls.

T326, Letters From and Opinions of Attorneys General, 1791-1811. 1 roll.

Opinions of Attorneys General, together with some letters and enclosures, regarding matters affecting the Department of State and the foreign relations of the United States. Most of these opinions have been printed (26th Cong., 2d sess., H. Doc. 123; and 31st Cong., 2d sess., H. Ex. Doc. 55). The letters and some of the other papers, however, are not printed with the opinions. Very few of the papers in this series are dated after 1802.

T412, Opinions of the Attorney General, 1817-1832. 3 rolls.

Official opinions on questions of law rendered by the Attorney General to the President, department heads, and on rare occasions to the chairmen of congressional committees.

T577, Index to Names of United States Marshals, 1789-1960. 1 roll, 16mm.

Card index to names of U.S. marshals compiled by the Executive Office of United States Marshals, Department of State. Arranged, alphabetically by name of marshal. Entries show date of marshal's nomination, date of commission, judicial district in which marshal served, name of predecessor, and source from which the compiler gathered his information.

Affairs in the Territories were under the direction of the Department of State from 1789 until 1873, when jurisdiction over the Territories was transferred to the Department of the Interior. M62, Records of the Office of the Secretary of the Interior Relating to the Yellowstone National Park, 1872-1886. 6 rolls.

Reproduced is the correspondence of the Office of the Secretary of the Interior relating to the Yellowstone National Park from its establishment in 1872 until 1886, in which year the Interior Department temporarily ceased to exercise major responsibility for administration of the park. The correspondence is divided into two categories: communications received and sent by the Patents and Miscellaneous Division of the Secretary's Office concerning general matters associated with the park's administration, and communications received and sent by the Appointments Division of that Office that relate principally to the appointment of park superintendents and their assistants.

M25, Miscellaneous Letters Sent by the General Land Office, 1796-1889. 228 rolls.

Copies of letters sent by the Secretary of the Treasury dealing with general policy in the administration of public lands, 1796-1812; copies of letters sent by the Register of the Treasury relating to the disposal of public lands, 1802-12; and copies of miscellaneous letters sent by the General Land Office relating to a wide variety of public land matters not dealt within other series. Indexed.

M27, Letters Sent by the General Land Office to Surveyors General, 1796-1901. 31 rolls.

Copies of letters sent by the Secretary of the Treasury, 1796-1812, and by the General Land Office, 1812-1901. The Office of

Surveyor General was established by an act of Congress in 1796, under authority of which a Surveyor General for the Northwest Territory was appointed. Other Surveyors General were appointed from time to time as other areas were designated by Congress as surveying districts. The offices of the Surveyors General carried on their work of surveying and mapping the public domain as independent agencies until 1836, when they were placed under the supervision of the Commissioner of the General Land Office.

M8, Journal and Report of James Leander Cathcart and James Hutton, Agents Appointed by the Secretary of the Navy to Survey Timber Resources Between the Mermentau and Mobile Rivers, 1818-1819. 1 roll.

Cathcart and Hutton were appointed by the Secretary of the Navy as timber agents to locate and reserve for naval purposes public lands lying in the region of the Gulf of Mexico between the Mermentau and Mobile Rivers. Their travels from November 1818 until May 1819 are described in the volume filmed in this publication. In addition to accounts of their explorations, this volume has an appendix containing copies of letters sent and received by Cathcart and Hutton during the period of their trip.

M68, List of North Carolina Land Grants in Tennessee, 1778-1791. 1 roll.

This publication reproduces a volume prepared in the Office of the Secretary of State of North Carolina in 1791 and submitted to Thomas Jefferson, Secretary of State, the same year. The land grants in the volume are arranged in five parts. Each part contains the following information: number of grant, name of grantee, number of acres, year the grant was made, county in which the grant was located, and position of the land.

M815, Oregon and Washington Donation Land Files, 1851-1903. 108 rolls.

The typical donation claim file includes some but not necessarily all of the documents required from each settler claiming a land donation. These were: notifications describing the land; Affidavit of Settler; Proofs of Cultivation; Settler's Oath, proof of citizenship; testimony on the settler's marital status; and an oath of allegiance. These forms and the donation certificate issued by local government officials were submitted to the General Land Office as the basis for issuing the patent.

M145, Abstracts of Oregon Donation Land Claims, 1852-1903. 6 rolls.

The records reproduced in this microcopy consist of a 12-volume series in which the General Land Office abstracted the basic facts concerning claims to "donation" land in Oregon, 1852-1903.

An alphabetical index has been filmed at the front of roll 1. These volumes contain abstracts of claims filed through the Oregon City and Roseburg Land Offices.

M203, Abstracts of Washington Donation Land Claims, 1855-1902. 1 roll.

- This publication reproduces a 3-volume series in which the General Land Office abstracted the basic facts concerning claims to "donation" land in Washington Territory and Washington State, 1855-1902. The entries are arranged by local land office, and thereunder by certificate number. An alphabetical index has been filmed at the beginning of the roll.

The Offices of the Secretary of the Treasury and the Register of the Treasury at first handled the disposition of the public domain, but in 1812 the General Land Office was established as a bureau in the Department to administer all public land transactions except surveying and mapping work. Surveyors General conducted surveys and mapped public lands almost independently until 1836, when they were placed in the GLO. In 1849 the GLO was transferred to the Department of the Interior. In 1946 the GLO and the Grazing Service were consolidated to form the Bureau of Land Management. The Bureau classifies, manages, and disposes of public lands and their resources, and it administers Federally owned mineral resources on non-Federal lands and on the Outer Continental Shelf.

The records include letters sent and received by state offices and suboffices; case files; township tract books and survey plats; registers and indexes of declaratory statements, entries, receipts, and certificates for homesteads, mineral, and timber culture lands. From 1789 until 1824 the administration of Indian affairs, except for the government-operated factory system of trade with the Indians, was under the direct supervision of the Secretary of War. The Bureau of Indian Affairs was not established within the War Department until March 11, 1824.

M15, Letters Sent by the Secretary of War Relating to Indian Affairs, 1800-1824. 6 rolls.

Handwritten copies of letters to Territorial Governors, officials of the Indian service, the Superintendent of Indian Trade, factors of trading posts, Indians, and others. Included are copies of addresses to Indian delegations, appointments, passports issued for travel in Indian country, and instructions to treaty commissioners.

T494, Documents Relating to the Negotiation of Ratified and Unratified Treaties With Various Tribes of Indians, 1801-1869. 10 rolls.

Journals of treaty commissioners, proceedings of councils, reports, and other records relating to the negotiation of Indian treaties that were ratified by the Senate and similar records pertaining to Indian treaties that were never ratified by the Senate. The original treaties are reproduced as M668, Ratified Indian Treaties, 1722-1869.

T58, Letters Received by the Superintendent of Indian Trade, 1806-1824. 1 roll.

Mainly correspondence received by the Superintendents of Indian Trade and some drafts of outgoing correspondence, memorandums, and accounting records. Included is incoming correspondence of the transportation agent for the liquidation of the factories.

M234, Letters Received by the Office of Indian Affairs, 1824-1881. 962 rolls.

These letters, from superintendencies, agencies, Indian schools, and other sources, contain significant information on the Government's administration of Indian affairs. Also included is valuable information on intertribal relationships and on the relations of Indians with white traders, settlers, and soldiers. The letters are registered in M18.

M348, Report Books, 1838-1885. 53 rolls.

These report books contain manuscript copies of communications sent by the Office of Indian Affairs to the member of the President's Cabinet having supervisory responsibility for Indian affairs. From 1832 until 1849 the Commissioner of Indian Affairs reported to the Secretary of War; thereafter he reported to the Secretary of the Interior. The report books contain in addition to communications to the Secretary, some copies of letters to the President, to chairmen and other members of committees of the House of Representatives and the Senate, to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, to the President of the Senate, and to other Government officials. The reports range from extensive narratives, such as annual reports, to brief letters transmitting documents or recommending an appointment.

Records of Superintendencies of Indian Affairs

During the 19th century there were two principal types of field jurisdictions within the Bureau of Indian Affairs: superintendencies and agencies. Superintendents had general responsibility for Indian affairs in a geographical area, usually a Territory; agents were immediately responsible for the affairs of one or more tribes. Until the 1870's most agents were responsible to a superintendent. The records of a superintendency relate to almost all aspects of Indian administration in the jurisdiction, including treaties, Indian subsistence, claims arising from Indian removal, land reserves, intrusions on Indian lands,

law and order, hostilities and depredation claims, annuity payments to Indians, location of agencies, schools, purchase of supplies, employees, and accounts. Most correspondence of the superintendent was conducted with the Commissioner of Indian Affairs and with agents in the superintendency, but there was also correspondence with Army officials, Indians, businessmen, and others.

M16, Letters Sent by the Superintendent of Indian Trade, 1807-1823. 6 rolls.

In 1806 an act of Congress authorized the appointment of a Superintendent of Indian Trade, empowered to "purchase and take charge of all goods intended for trade with the Indian nations" and to supervise the operations of Government trading houses or "factories." The letters include instructions and other communications to factories; letters to businessmen and purchasing agents concerning the nature, quality, and price of goods to be purchased; and communications to U.S. consuls abroad concerning the disposal of peltries at auction and the purchase of goods.

M74, Letters of Tench Coxe, Commissioner of the Revenue, Relating to the Procurement of Military, Naval, and Indian Supplies, 1794-1796. 1 roll.

As Commissioner of the Revenue under the Treasury Department, Tench Coxe was charged with the collection of revenues as well as any other duties that might be assigned by the Secretary of the Treasury. Beginning in April 1794, one of these other duties was the function of supply procurement, which Coxe performed until the end of 1794 when he resigned that function. Coxe however continued to accept responsibility for procurement initiated in 1794 but not completed until later. About 80% of this letterbook contains copies of letters sent in 1794. The remainder concerns unfinished business begun in 1794.

M4, Letterbook of Creek Trading House, 1795-1816. 1 roll.

Handwritten copies of letters sent to Government officials, Army officers, merchants, and others by the agent of the trading house or factory operated by the United States for the purpose of trading with the Creek Indians, 1795-1816. In addition to documenting the trading business at the factory, the letters contain information about goods needed for the trade, shipment of goods to be traded for furs, pelts, competition with private traders, relations with the military, and conditions among the Indians.

M574, Special Files of the Office of Indian Affairs, 1807-1904.
85 rolls.

The special files consist of correspondence, reports, accounts, affidavits, and other records that were brought together for easier reference. The records relate mainly to claims and investigations. The claims include those of traders for goods furnished to Indians or the Government, of attorneys for legal fees, of both Indians and whites for losses from depredations, and of Indians for losses resulting from their removal from the East. The investigations, other than those of claims, were mainly of the conduct of employees of the Office.

M21, Letters Sent by the Office of Indian Affairs, 1824-1881.
166 rolls.

Handwritten transcripts of communications sent by the Office of Indian Affairs. The letters, which were copied into volumes, include instructions to superintendents, agents, and other field officials of the Office; reports to the Secretary of War; acknowledgements of and replies to incoming letters; notices of appointment; and many other communications concerning all aspects of the operations of the Office.

M18, Records of the Office of Indian Affairs, Registers of Letters Received, 1824-1880. 126 rolls.

Alphabetically arranged registers for the records filmed as M234. The information given for each letter includes the name of the writer; the date the letter was written; place where it was written; a summary of its contents; the heading under which the letter was filed; after April 1834, the date it was received; and after June 1836, the file number assigned to each letter.

M595, Indian Census Rolls, 1884-1940. 692 rolls. The Seattle Archives Branch has only 333 rolls.

Indian census rolls were usually submitted each year by agents or superintendents in charge of reservations as required by an act of Congress of July 4, 1884. The information in the rolls varies to some extent, but usually given is the English and/or Indian name of the person, roll number, age or date of birth, sex, and relationship to head of the family.

These consist mainly of communications and letters received from the Office of the Chief of Engineers and the Department of the Treasury, and copies of letters and reports sent to the Office of the Chief of Engineers. The survey, which was headed by Clarence King, was authorized by an act of March 2, 1867, and provided for geological and topographical exploration of the territory between the Rocky Mountains and the Sierra Nevada Mountains.

M156, Letters Received by the Powell Survey, 1869-1879. 10 rolls.

Letters received by Major John Wesley Powell, Director of the Geographical and Geological Survey of the Rocky Mountain Region, generally referred to as the Powell Survey. There are letters from Government officials, prominent scientists, frontiersmen, editors, and others.

TEXTUAL RECORDS

Records of the Alaskan Territorial Government, 1884-1958. 297 cf. (9:90 m3).

From the time the United States purchased Alaska from Russia in 1867 to the passage of an act of May 17, 1884, there was no formal civil government in Alaska. Limited control of the area was exercised by the U.S. Army, 1867-77; the Department of the Treasury through the Collector of Customs at Sitka, other collectors, and the Revenue-Cutter Service, ca. 1877-79; and the Department of the Navy, 1879-84.

The 1884 act provided for the civil government of Alaska under a Governor, established the temporary seat of that government at Sitka, and conferred district status on Alaska. It also empowered the Secretary of the Interior to regulate the enforcement of Federal laws relating to mining claims and provide for education in the area. Under an act of July 24, 1897, a surveyor general was appointed for the U. S. District of Alaska. Homestead laws were extended to the District and provisions were made for railroad rights-of-way by an act of May 14, 1898. An act of June 6, 1900, assigned to the civil government responsibility for the care of the insane under the direction of the Secretary of the Interior. Provisions of that act also extended and defined the organization of the civil government and the courts. Alaska was formally designated a U.S. Territory and its

capital was established at Juneau by an act of August 24, 1912. The Alaska Mental Health Enabling Act of July 28, 1956, transferred the Interior Department's responsibility for the care of the insane to the Territorial government. Provisions for admitting Alaska into the Union as a State were included in an act of July 7, 1958, and the formal admission was completed January 3, 1959, under Presidential Proclamation 3269.

These include the Executive Office central file ("Term of Office File"), 1884-1920; administrative records, 1885-1912; the Governors' annual reports, 1917-57; letters received and sent by the Secretary of Alaska, 1900-13; general correspondence, 1909-58; Territorial government legislative records, 1913-39; reports from surveys and studies, 1910-58; records relating to emergency relief programs, 1934-41, and to the Alaska rural rehabilitation project, 1935-49; expenditure and accounting records, 1913-52; and correspondence relating to the care of the insane, 1905-33.

The Public Contracts Division was created in the Labor Department to administer the Walsh-Healey Public Contracts Act of June 30, 1936, which required Government supply contracts exceeding \$10,000 to stipulate minimum wage, overtime pay, nonemployment of child and convict labor, and safety and health standards. The two Divisions were consolidated into the Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions in 1942. In 1971 the organization was placed under the newly created Employment Standards Administration and was renamed the Wage and Hour Division. The Seattle Branch has the following holdings:

In July 1951 the OHE was abolished and its functions transferred to the Office of Rent Stabilization of the Economic Stabilization Agency and to the Housing and Home Finance Agency.

Many letters relate to such details as the purchase of whale oil, lanterns, chains, buoys, and other supplies; the appointment of employees; keeping and settling of accounts; and negotiation of contracts. For the period 1801-9 some of the letters are from the Secretary of the Treasury.

The U. S. Coast Guard, established in the Department of the Treasury in 1915 was formed by consolidating the Department's Revenue-Cutter and Lifesaving Services. It took over light-house administration in 1939, and in 1942 functions of the Bureau of Marine Inspection and Navigation relating to navigation and vessel inspection laws and to merchant seamen were transferred to the Coast Guard. In 1967 the Coast Guard became a part of the Department of Transportation and the functions of admeasuring and documenting American vessels were transferred from the Bureau of Customs to the Coast Guard. The major duties of the Coast Guard include enforcing customs and navigation laws, supervising vessel anchorages and movements, reporting marine casualties, protecting life and property at sea, installing and maintaining aids to navigation and to transoceanic aviation, and carrying on oceanographic observations.

Branch holdings include unit logs of vessels and short installations from Alaska, Oregon, and Washington.

The FCA assumed functions of the Federal Farm Loan Bureau, directed by the Federal Farm Loan Board; the Federal Farm Board; the Crop Production and Seed Loan Offices of the Department of Agriculture; and regional agricultural credit corporations. Under provisions of the Farm Credit Act of June 16, 1933, the FCA established production credit corporations and associations providing credit for farm and ranch operations and created banks for cooperatives

as a permanent source of credit for farmers' cooperative associations. An act of January 31, 1934, made the FCA responsible for the management of the Federal Farm Mortgage Corporation, and from 1934 to 1942 it also supervised Federal credit unions. On July 1, 1939, the FCA was placed under the Department of Agriculture, but on December 4, 1953, with the exception of its Cooperative Research and Service Division (renamed Farm Cooperative Service), it again became an independent agency.

The Office of Defense Transportation (ODT), successor to the Transportation Division of the Advisory Commission to the Council of National Defense, was established in the Office for Emergency Management on December 18, 1941, with responsibility for assuring "maximum utilization of the domestic transportation facilities . . . for the successful prosecution of the war." The ODT was authorized to coordinate activities of Federal agencies and private transportation groups in adjusting domestic transportation systems to the necessities of war, determine the adequacy of transport facilities and act to provide necessary additional facilities, coordinate and direct traffic movement to prevent congestion, coordinate domestic traffic movements with ocean shipping in conjunction with the U. S. Maritime Commission and other agencies, determine storage and warehouse requirements, represent the defense interest of the Government in rate matters, and recommend emergency legislation affecting domestic transportation. The ODT was also authorized to limit and regulate domestic use of transportation facilities; advise and assist Federal, State, and local agencies and private organizations in providing transportation service for personnel essential to the military and civilian war effort; review and approve Federal contracts and arrangements involving local passenger transportation to war plants and establishments; operate transportation properties seized by the Government; and act in matters relating to airline needs of materials and manpower.

The prosecution exhibits drawn from this series were used largely in the following four cases before the Tribunals: United States of America v. Friedrich Flick et al. (Case 5), v. Karl Krauch et al. (Case 6), v. Alfried Krupp et al. (Case 10), v. Ernst von Weizsaecker et al. (Case 11).

T990, Mauthausen Death Books, 1939-1945. 2 rolls.

The seven volumes reproduced on this microfilm publication contain personal data, such as name, date of birth, and date of death of about 100,000 inmates at Mauthausen concentration camp. These volumes were introduced by the U.S. prosecution staff as USA Exhibit 250 before the International Military Tribunal (IMT).

T991, United States Trial Briefs and Document Books of the International Military Tribunal, 1945-1946. 1 roll.

This publication consists of trial briefs assembled by the office of the U.S. Chief of Counsel for the Prosecution of Axis Criminality (OCCPAC) for presentation to the IMT at Nuremberg from November 14, 1945, to October 1, 1946, and German documents used by OCCPAC as court exhibits, which were translated into English and assembled in document books.

T989, War Diaries and Correspondence of General Alfred Jodl, 1938-1945. 2 rolls.

These documents were assembled for the prosecution of General Alfred Jodl, a defendant before the IMT, and include war diaries of the German Armed Forces High Command (OKW), situation reports of the German Armed Forces High Command Operations Section (WFst), a Hitler memorandum on German defense (1938), and excerpts from General Jodl's diary. The documents are described in greater detail in National Archives Preliminary Inventory No. 21, pages 174 and 175.

T988, Prosecution Exhibits Submitted to the International Military Tribunal, 1946. 54 rolls..

The documents reproduced on this microfilm publication consist of material introduced as evidence against the major Nazi war criminals by the prosecution staffs of the United States, Great Britain, France, and the Soviet Union. The documents consist of a wide variety of record items ranging from directives signed by Hitler and the highest German officials to newspaper excerpts. These exhibits are described in National Archives Preliminary Inventory No. 21, pages 25-173, and in volume XXIV of Trial of the Major War Criminals Before the International Military Tribunal, Nuremberg 14 November 1945-1 October 1946 (Nuremberg, 1949).

T992, Diary of Hans Frank, 1939-1945. 12 rolls.

This microfilm publication reproduces the diaries of Hans Frank, Governor General of German-occupied Polish territory from 1939 until 1945. The diaries, consisting of 38 volumes, present a detailed record of daily occurrences in the Governor General's office, including personal comments, minutes of meetings, directives, letters, and other items.
