Educators should bear in mind that materials included on this list were selected from those which publishers chose to submit for evaluation and may assume that materials available for purchase not appearing on the list either were not submitted for evaluation or received unfavorable reviews. Information about negative reviews, which do not appear on this bibliography, can be obtained by writing or calling the Materials Review and Evaluation Center. At the end of this bibliography may be found an unannotated list of books which have had favorable reviews in reliable reviewing sources.

The levels at which the media may be used most effectively are indicated by "K" (Kindergarten), "prim" (primary: Grades 1-3), "elem" (elementary: Grades 4-6), "jhs" (junior high school: Grades 7-8[9]), and "shs" (senior high school: Grades [9]10-12). The insertion of an arabic numeral after the grade level indicates that the item is especially pertinent at that specific grade level--e.g., "prim-2," "elem-6.".

In some cases prices were not available. Prices shown are those quoted by publishers and producers. Prices quoted do not include postage and are subject to change.

All items included on this bibliography except 16mm films and some items suggested for inclusion by local school administrative units are displayed in the Materials Review and Evaluation Center at 620 North West Street in Raleigh.

Arnett, Ethel. Stephens. THE SAURA AND KEYAUWEE IN THE LAND THAT BECAME GUILFORD, RANDOLPH, AND ROCKINGHAM. Media Inc., 1975. (available from McNairy). 92 p. \$1.90 paper. elem jhs she

Although a description of two Indian tribes, Saura and Keyauwee, first known inhabitants of Guilford, Randolph, and Rockingham Counties, text actually represents general ways of life among American Indians at time of national settlement; draws on John Lawson's HISTORY OF NORTH CAROLINA; illustrated with John White's drawings; easy reading, short chapters; much interesting information

Arthur, John Preston. WESTERN NORTH CAROLINA: A HISTORY FROM 1730 TO 1913. Reprint, 1973. 711 p. \$27. shs

Facsimile reprint of 1914 edition; very detailed history which includes various boundary changes of western North Carolina as well as discussion of industry; customs, events, people, places of the region; interesting but difficult reading; suitable for very large collections; of regional interest

- Bailey, Louise Howe. GO HOME WI' ME. Bailey, 1974. 114 p. \$3.95 paper. jhs
 Folklore and mores of North Carolina mountain people in fitting language and dialect;
 events and everyday experiences that once were a way of life-e.g., worm-fiddling
 and medical remedies; lacks index; poorly bound
- Barbour, Ruth P. CRUISE OF THE SNAP DRAGON. Blair, 1976. 211 p. \$8.95. elem-6 jhs Captain Otway Burns, a commissioned privateer during the trouble with Britain around 1821, takes the SNAP DRAGON on its first voyage; sea adventure based on historical facts; notes and bibliography; North Carolina setting provides enrichment reading for junior high social studies program
- Beatty, John and Patricia. WHO COMES TO KING'S MOUNTAIN? Morrow, 1975. 287 p. \$5.11.

Revolutionary War story featuring teen-aged hero, Alex, in dramatic wartime adventures; living conditions, factionalism in South depicted--Loyalists vs. Patriots; reveals that colonists fought not only British but also each other (Wilkes County)

Bell, Mae Woods. WRYMES: A LIGHT-HEARTED LOOK AT HEAVY-HANDED REALITY. Bell, 1976.

Collection of some 130 witty, wise poems, each four rhymed lines, poking humorous, telling fun at some of the foibles of our time; excellent illustrations of puns and plays on words; poems to make one laugh and think

Bivins, John, Jr. THE MORAVIAN POTTERS IN NORTH CAROLINA. "U. of N.C. Pr., 1972. 300 p. \$12.95. shs.

Highly specialized treatment of contributions of early Moravian craftsmen-potters in Bethabara-Old Salem settlements; detailed examination of entire tradition of pottery-making--masters, apprentices, journeymen, clay, wheel, kiln, etc.; photographs of excavated sites, preserved molds, samples from different periods; much history weven into text drawn from Moravians' meticulously preserved records;

Blackwelder, Ruth. OLD CHARLOTTE AND OLD MECKLENBURG TODAY. Mecklenburg Hist. Assn., 1973. 56 p. \$5. elem jhs shs

Attractive short history of Charlotte and Mecklenburg County; fully illustrated in color photos of important sites, expecially interiors and close-ups of old homes, other structures; local history through tour of homes, churches, cemeteries, etc.; encourages respect for preservation, restoration of landmarks

Bohanan, Mary. EARTH BOSOM AND COLLECTED POEMS. Carlton, 1973 48 p. \$3. she

Collection of verse reminiscent of Romantic period, strongly emotional, in some cases detrimental to poetic effort; although uneven in quality, poems express soul hunger, loneliness, captured at times in startlingly vivid metaphor; the author, a North Carolina Central University teacher, sensitively conveys the black experience; diverse poetic forms from sonnet to free verse; sometimes stilted ("o'ercome"), but often quite original, vigorous

Bolte, Mary, and Mary Eastman. DARK AND BLOODIED GROUND. Chatham, 1973. 128 p. \$8.50

Violent, sinister, often witty tales that have historic basis, geographic locations from West Virginia to North Carolina; Tar Heel folklore includes Brown Mountain Lights, Theodosia Burr's death, Kill Devil Hills legends, Blackbeard, Maco Light, Frankie Silvers murder case; black-and-white photos extend chilling narratives; oversized format; attractive browsing item

Bragg, Cecil S. OCRACOKE ISLAND: PEARL OF THE OUTER BANKS. Times Printing, 1973. 188 p. \$5.95. shs

People, places, events recalled from author's childhood on Ocracoke; interesting stories about shipwrecks, local families; Bragg is not a gifted, polished writer—his prose is no model for students—but some human—interest stories and tidbits of local color probably are not available elsewhere

Brawley, James S. ROWAN COUNTY: A BRIEF HISTORY. A.&H., 1974. 178 p. \$1.50 paper. jhs shs

History of Rowan County from colonial period to the present; one in a series of publications of short histories of North Carolina counties; illustrated; not securely bound; of regional interest

Burchard, Marshall and Sue. SPORTS HERO: RICHARD PETTY. Putnam, 1974. 95 p. \$4.69 prim elem

High-interest/low-vocabulary biography of stock car driver, Richard Petty, in exciting, easy-to-read style; a danger in such a portrait is that of patronizing the "hero"--the Burchards avoid that trap (Chapel Hill)

Burney, Eugenia. COLONIAL NORTH CARCLINA. Nelson, 1975. 176 p. \$6.95. jhs shs
Excellent, colorful history of Colonial North Carolina tracing State's expansion
from Fort Raleigh (1585) to ratification of Constitution (1789) in thoroughly readable,
chronological account rich with little-known details; brings alive personalities
from State's early history in vivid, telling glimpses of their hardships, failings,
merits; authentic, balanced portraits; material appears well researched, though many
quotations are attributed vaguely to "an eyewitness" or "a British observer"; old
prints, maps, documents, photographs, and guides; comprehensive bibliography; for
senior high groups or strong junior high readers; excellent teacher resource; one
title from series tracing history of each of original 13 colonies

Burt, Jesse, and Robert B. Ferguson. INDIANS OF THE SOUTHEAST: THEN AND NOW.
Abingdon, 1973. 304 p. \$8.95: jhs shs

Various Indian tribes and their customs discussed from historic and modern perspectives; illustrated with old prints, drawings, photographs—some in color; bibliography, glossary, index, list of places to see and experience contemporary Indian activities; useful for reference, Indian heritage discussions

Cairns, Huntington. THIS OTHER EDEN: ASPECTS OF THE NATURAL HISTORY OF THE OUTER BANKS OF NORTH CAROLINA. Times Printing, 1974. 76 p. \$2.95 paper. jhs-9 shs.

Small paperback on North Carolina's Outer Banks, commenting in philosophic, picturesque prose on abundance of nature preserved undisturbed; notes on plant and animal life include analysis of mathematically concentric perfection of shells and sunflowers, descriptions of prehistoric artifacts, speculation on Banks' origins; author's familiarity with literature as well as flora and fauna account for relaxed, engaging style; excellent source for science classes or study of informal essay in English classes.

Camblos, Ruth, and Virginia Winger. SHOPPING 'ROUND THE MOUNTAINS.' Shopping, 1973.

Guide to off-beat or little known restaurants, crafts shops, art galleries, gem mines, antique shops, tucked away in mountains of North Carolina; each place annotated in spirited, succinct description; notes on sightseeing and events in each locale; for inveterate shoppers, food fanciers.

Cantrell, Roy. MY FRIENDS THE CHEROKEES. Roy Cantrell, 1973. 32 p. \$1,25 paper. jhs shs

Brief, informal interviews with some 20 native Cherokees living in western North Carolina on Cherokee Indian Reservation; describes their efforts to preserve traditions, heritage—e.g. Schesnut bread, bean bread, art of making tomahawks, crafts such as carving, beadwork, pottery; text is largely direct quotation of Cherokees interviewed; black—and—white snapshots

Cecil, William A. V. BILTMORE: THE VISION AND REALITY OF GEORGE W. VANDERBILT, RICHARD MORRIS HUNT AND FREDERICK LAW OLMSTED. Biltmore, 1975. 96 p. \$4 paper. elem-4 jhs

Black-and-white photographs, minimal text about Biltmore estate near Asheville; uncaptioned, grainy pictures obviously made from old negatives; large print, fairly easy vocabulary, although sentences split by several pages of photographs hamper comprehension; purchase if demand justifies; some good content

Chaney, James A., éd. *CAROLINA COUNTRY* READER. Moore, 1973. 269 p. \$5.95. jhs shs Miscellany written or collected by former NEWS AND OBSERVER book editor, Jim Chaney: poems, short stories, essays, other pieces pulled together from *CAROLINA COUNTRY*; although literary value is somewhat dubious, the warm, homespun quality,

unpretentious devotion to our state, and authentic ring of dialogues and anecdotes induce a cozy reverie; tales of Tom Dooley, special Christmases at Josephus Daniels Mansion, long-ago Fourth of July celebrations supply enriching background to study of North Carolina

Clancy, Paul R. JUST A COUNTRY LAWYER: A BROGRAPHY OF SENATOR SAN ERVIN.
Ind. U. Pr., 1974. 310 p. \$8.50. jhs shs

Sam Ervin--lawyer, judge, Congressman (filling his brother's unexpired term), N. C. Supreme Court justice, Senator--is shown as a man molded by his generation but famous defender of Constitution and civil liberties; highly readable

Cleaver, Vera and Bill. TRIAL VALLEY. Lippincott, 1977. 158 p. \$7.95. elem-6 jhs shs

Mary Call has kept the family together since last seen in WHERE THE LILIES BLOOM; now there is a lonely, abused walf to contend with; Mary battles family, romantic ties, personal feelings; North Carolina mountain setting; for better readers



Cooper, Horton. NORTH CAROLINA MOUNTAIN FOLKLORE AND MISCELLANY. Johnson N.C., 1972.

Rambling catalogue of Tar Heel mountain lore and wisdom in riddles, proverbs, colloquialisms, superstitions, customs, ballads, ghost tales, weather wisdom, more; captures the flavor of mountaineer fun, traditions; many old sayings and superstitions are universal to the South; much of text is epigrammatic listing rather than exposition; black-and-white illustrations

Cotten, Sallie Southall. THE WHITE DOE: THE FATE OF VIRGINIA DARE. AN INDIAN LEGEND. Johnson, 1975. 94 p. \$4.95. jhs shs

Narrative poem of Indian legend explaining Virginia Dare's fate, written in familiar meter of Longfellow's HIAWATHA; tells of lovely English maiden transformed into white doe by Indian wizard and former suitor, and describes subsequent events in White Doe's tragic life; interesting for historical value

Crabtree, Beth G. NORTH CAROLINA GOVERNORS, 1585-1974: BRIEF SKETCHES. Rev. ed. A.&H., 1974. 189-14. \$3 paper. jhs shs

Thumbnail sketches of North Carolina's chief executives from Ralph Lane, leader of futile Fort Raleigh effort (1585-1586), to James E. Holshouser, Jr.; concise, factual information on each man's contributions; extensive appendices include dates of birth, terms of office, political parties, places of burial, signatures, more; where obtainable, pictures of each governor appear; revised, updated edition of 1958 title; well-bound, attractive paperback

Dial, Adolph L., and David K. Eliades. THE ONLY LAND I KNOW: A HISTORY OF THE LUMBEE INDIANS. The Indian Historian Press, 1975. 188 p. \$9.75. \$6.paper. jhs shs

Interesting account of North Carolina Lumbee Indian population in Robeson County and surrbunding area in legends, myths, factual information, much of which was secured through oral history; few secondary students are acquainted with heritage and culture of these 40,000 Americans who have suffered but survived difficult times; excellent description of how they prevailed against overwhelming odds

Eaton, Allen H. HANDICRAFTS OF THE SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS. Dover, 1973. 370 p. \$5 paper.

Reprint of 1937 edition with new preface, new introduction; excellent collection of information on traditional mountain crafts, stories about people involved in organizing craftsmen into guilds; covers heritage of Southern Highlands, différent schools organized to train craftsmen; some crafts included are spinning, weaving, dyes, woodwork, baskets, toys, pottery, hand-made instruments; some photos; well documented

Evans, Eli N. THE PROVINCIALS: A PERSONAL HISTORY OF JEWS IN THE SQUTH.
Atheneum, 1973. 369 p. \$10.95. shs

Durham native speaks personally of his heritage in the context of Jewish provincialism in the South; discusses historical beginnings and current relationships of Jews with their fellow Southerners; well written and readable; one need not be Jewish to be interested

The Executive Mansion Fine Arts Committee. THE EXECUTIVE MANSION, RALEIGN, NORTH CAROLINA. 3rd ed. Alderman, 1976. (available from A.&H.) 40 p. \$2.50 paper. elem jhs shs

Photo-essay on Governor's residence from first plain 1797 dwelling through 1976 renovation of present Executive Mansion; excerpts from letters by former governors who lived in Mansion, architects' suggestions, legislative acts to renovate Mansion center on architectural history; beautiful, captioned color photographs

Fanning, David. THE NARRATIVE OF COLONEL DAVID FANNING (A TORY IN THE REVOLUTIONARY
WAR WITH GREAT BRITAIN): GIVING AN ACCOUNT OF HIS ADVENTURES IN NORTH CAROLINA FROM
1775 TO 1783, WRITTEN BY HIMSELF. Reprint, 1973. 95 p. \$10.50. Shs

The other side of the story from the pen of a Revolutionary soldier who fought for the King in North Carolina; Fanning recounts sadly, bitterly, the loss of "a free and mild government," thanks to "Rebels" incited to brave any danger in defiance of the Crown; 'old-Fashioned writing style will impede all but best students; some fine nuggets here on opposition's view; insight for teachers of N. C. history

Fisher, Allan C., Jr. AMERICAN INLAND WATERWAY: EXPLORING THE ATLANTIC SEABOARD.
Natl. Geog., 1973. 207 p. \$3.50. elem-6 jhs, shs

Fascinating world of inland waterway that winds from Boston to Key West in readable text and pictures beautiful beyond belief; book travels through villages, canals, locks, sounds, metropolitan cities that make inland waterway a one-of-a-kind introduction to east coast of U.S.A.; Belhaven, Lake Drummond, boat building at Harkers Island, Fort Fisher are N. C. scenes described

Fisher, Ronald M. THE APPALACHIAN TRAIL. Natl. Geog., 1972. 199 p. \$3.50. jhs shs
Through narrative and exquisite photographs of their trek over Appalachian Trail,
three backpackers relate experiences along picturesque footpath which follows crests
of mountains from Georgia to Maine; much of the book devoted to depicting places
and characterizing inhabitants of mountain areas near Trail; foreword gives brief
history of Trail; epilogue offers tips to hikers; indexed; a book to hold any reader's
interest

Forbes, Tom H. QUINCY'S HARVEST. Lippincott, 1976. 143°p. \$6.95. elem jhs

Quincy, son of eastern North Carolina sharecropper, finds friendship with elderly black who tries to help him understand necessity of killing marauding animals while also enjoying nature's beauty; low-keyed; boys will like it; North Carolina author

Gerson, Noel B. THE TRIAL OF ANDREW JOHNSON. Nelson, 1977. 159 p. \$6.95. shs

Recounts events leading up to impeachment trial of Andrew Johnson, fostered by radical Republicans vindictive toward South; Johnson is portrayed sympathetically and his election later as U. S. Senator discussed; brief bibliography; index

Gerson, Noel'B. THE VELVET GLOVE. Nelson, 1975. 264 p. \$6.95. jhs shs

Well-written, entertaining biography of First Lady, Dolly Madison, emphasizing her life in Washington after marrying James Madison; much U. S. history, many vital personalities of the era emerge; Dolly herself is an engaging, endlessly interesting figure whose courage and wit are well caught in carefully researched, lively telling; for senior high and strong junior high readers; bibliography, index

Glasser, Barbara, and Ellen Blustein. BONGO BRADLEY. Hawthorn, 1973. 153 p. \$5.95. elem-6 jhs shs

When cousin Bradley from New York spends two months in North Carolina during tobacco harvesting time, Tar Heel Vernon misunderstands Bradley's "city ways" and Bradley finds rural life hard and demanding; finally both boys discover common ground for understanding, accepting each other; easy fiction

Glubok, Shirley. THE ART OF THE WOODLAND INDIANS. Macmillan, 1976. 48 p. \$7.95. elem jhs

So much of this series suffers from lack of color reproductions, but for once the story starts in North Carolina with our coastal Indians of Lost Colony period; information on inventions, ideas of early American Indians exceeds pictures in interest; easy to read. J.H.

Graves, Charles P. THE WRIGHT BROTHERS. Putnam, 1973. 62 p. \$3.39. prim-3 elem

Simple biography of Wright brothers, tracing their love of invention from boyhood schemes to historical Kitty Hawk flight; illustrations; a SEE AND READ biography

Griffin, Frances, ed. THE THREE FORKS OF MUDDY CREEK, VOLUME 1. Old Salem, 1974.

First volume in forthcoming series on early Moravians in North Carolina; much primary source content in appealing, historically reliable account strengthened by attention to meticulous diaries, minutes, church books, memoirs, letters of Moravians; centers on outstanding personalities who led Moravian community (George Frederic Bahnson, Dr. Samuel Benjamin Vierking) or who symbolize strong, simple faith of the sect-e.g., Martha Miksch Vierling; rebels against strict Moravian code whose influence eventually brought revision are represented by Gottlieb Schober, his free-thinking daughter, Johanna; excellent introduction to study of Moravian settlers which quotes copiously from firsthand accounts

Gulick, John. CHEROKEES AT THE CROSSROADS. Rev. ed. Inst. for Research, 1973. 222 p. \$5 paper. shs

Anthropological study of present-day Eastern band of Cherokee Indians, first published in 1960 but updated with additional chapter in this edition; studies family structure, economy, education, etc; bibliography and index; scholarly monograph for large collections

Gurko, Leo. THOMAS WOLFE: BEXOND THE ROMANTIC EGO. Crowell, 1975. 183 p. \$5.95. she
Looks at Thomas Wolfe's achievement as reflected in his life, personality, art;
concise resumé with glimpses into motivation and personality, critiques of his works,
and an examination of clichés about Wolfe--e.g., were his novels autobiographical?
Emotionally immature? A search for a lost father?

Gustkey, Earl. ROMAN GABRIEL: OUTSTANDING PRO. Putnam, 1974. 159 p. \$4.95. elem jhs In-depth look at popular star quarterback from Wilmington, North Carolina, tracing his career from vacant lots of Wilmington to Philadelphia Eagles, from outstanding college player at N. C. State University to leadership of Los Angeles Rams; analyzes every aspect of his game from coaching and plays to team morale; retrospective interview with Gabriel himself; indexed

Haas, Irvin AMERICA'S HISTORIC VILLAGES AND RESTORATIONS. Arco, 1974. 150 p. \$8.95. jhs shs

Photographic essay on Outer Banks, Roanoke Island, Soundside river towns, including Edenton, Bath, Effizabeth City, Murfreesboro; good black-and-white photography; text too difficult for elementary students, but photos effectively convey flavor of area; light-weight introduction useful as supplement

Morgan, David T., and William J. Schmidt. NORTH CAROLINIANS IN THE CONTINENTAL CONGRESS.

Story of 12-year-old Rosalee Brigham, spunky tomboy ahead of her time in provincial, insular Arnold's Corners; when Rosalee becomes friendly with a hippie, a young black girl, and a mysterious seamstress of questionable background, things get tense in Southern town; North Carolina author has caught flavor, thinking of rural Southern communities; main character is entertaining, well defined; pat ending and almost stock villains thickening the plot are unconvincing, but story is fast-paced

Comprehensive analysis of N. C. General Assembly in profiles of 170 Representatives and Senators, facts about their districts, backgrounds, legislative activities; designed to enable North Carolinians to assess legislators' performances through each legislator's voting record, committee assignments, occupation, campaign contributions and expenditures; also profiles each legislative district is demographic data, voter registration statistics, 1974 legislative election results; introduction describes legislative process, lists sources of additional information; appendices include registered lobbyists categorized by industry, the most effective legislators and lobbyists as chosen by legislators, and a list of campaign contributions from political committees; the only complete resource book on North Carolina legislators (Note: Schools, should check with publishers for information on revised, updated editions of this publication.)

Ogburn, Charlton. THE SOUTHERN APPALACHIANS: A WILDERNESS QUEST. Morrow, 1975.

The magic and beauty of the Great Smokies, Blue Ridge, and Cumberlands in poetic if difficult (at times) reading which successfully shifts from physical descriptions to geologic history of ranges, to vivid depictions of living flora and fauna; between the facts, a genuine love for mountains prevails

Owen, Guy. THE FLIM-FLAM MAN AND THE APPRENTICE GRIFTER. Crown, 1972. 250 p. \$5.95.

Rollicking sequel to Guy Owen's popular FLIM-FLAM MAN which pairs the same peerless team of Mordecai Jones and Curley Treadaway, notorious rascals who continue their romp over North Carolina aided and abetted this time by comely Bonnie Lee Packard; those who chuckled over first tall tale will enjoy picaresque adventures resumed in this good, old-fashioned story; dialogue often humorously bawdy but not vulgar—there's a difference—still, examine this one before purchase or classroom use if your sensibilities are easily offended!

Parramore, Thomas C. CRADLE OF THE COLONY: THE HISTORY OF CHOWAN COUNTY AND EDENTON, NORTH CAROLINA. Eden Pr., 1967. 92 p. \$1.95 paper. jhs shs

Booklet focusing on Albemarle region of North Carolina, first area settled by Englishmen; although Edenton and Chowan County are highlighted, text is useful for general study of North Carolina and United States history; especially helpful in showing local issues that led to American Revolution; useful in eighth grade courses, senior high local history courses in northeastern North Carolina

Pierce, Ovid Williams. THE WEDDING GUEST. Doubleday, 1974. 368 p. \$7.95. shs

Typically graceful, introspective novel from writer whose previous works were also set in North Carolina; in flashbacks, Professor Kirby Wilson remembers his cousin Anna's marriage to his college friend, her vain efforts to assert herself as true mistress:

Simple tour with glossy, full-color photos, brief text explaining activities, sights to see in Great Smoky Mountains National Park located in North Carolina and Tennessee; several photos show old-time recreations at Cades Cowe and Farmstead at Occupaluftee

RALEIGH: A GUIDE TO NORTH CAROLINA'S CAPITAL Raleigh, 1975. 100 p. \$2.06 paper, plus tax and postage elem jhs shs

Well-done introduction to the Capital City written with flair, homor that lift it from slick, self-applauding tour books; facts are here—the who, where, when, and why of museums, government buildings, libraries, historic residences, etc., also photographs (well identified), hours open to public, admission fees, telephone numbers; nearly every spot of interest enlivened by anecdote or legend associated with it; having seen the guide, young visitors to Raleigh will recognize many historic sites, thanks to human—interest aspects cleverly interwoven with facts; indexed; credits and sources acknowledged; good print, attractive format

Campbell Reeves's talent for clear, precise images continues strong, though this poetry publication is marked by strange thematic evasiveness; water images prevail as Reedes again draws evocatively on her New Zealand heritage for inspiration; although many of her best statements are in sharp satiric focus, others seem obscured by deliberately dreamlike ambiguity; English faculty should review before purchase

Roberts, Bruce and Nancy. GHOSTS AND SPECTERS: TEN SUPERNATURAL STORIES. Doubleday, 1974. 93 p. \$4.95. prim-3 elem jhs-7

Collection of Southern ghost stories uniquely illustrated with photographs of actual sites of ghostly haunts; simple sentence structure may add more to low-vocabulary lesson than it detracts from the telling of the stories

Roberts, Bruce and Nancy. THE GOODLIEST LAND: NORTH CAROLINA. Doubleday, 1973. 176 p. \$9.95. elem jhs shs

Handsome text combining Nancy Roberts' prose and Bruce Roberts' photographs in Manteo-to-Murphy overview of State; black-and-white pictures of dogwoods, tobacco fields, piney woods, mountain sunsets, dunes and sea oats, industrial centers; highlights history, geography, agriculture, manufacturing; both text and photography evince concern for vanishing way of life; some color photos

Russell, Phillips. THESE OLD STONE WALLS. Chapel Hill Hist. Soc., 1972. 154 p. \$5. jhs-9 shs

Interesting informal essays on little-known sidelights of history of University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill; Russell, long-time creative writing instructor at University, describes alleged duel fought at mysterious Gimghoul Castle, strange circumstances surrounding 1799 expulsion of future Senator Thomas Hart Benton, various black servants beloved by generations of students and faculty, and endearing or eccentric habits of University figures as diverse as William Davie, Dr. Joseph Caldwell, Kemp Battle; Carolina fans will love this one; many tidbits for research efforts on the University

Sanders, Charles Richard. THE CAMERON PLANTATION IN CENTRAL NORTH CAROLINA (1776-1973)
AND ITS FOUNDER RICHARD BENNEHAN. Sanders, 1974. 79 p. \$11. jhs shs " "

History of prominent Cameron-Bennehan family who amassed great wealth and property in North Carolina in early 19th century and established a splendid plantation (actually four plantations) extending throughout Durham, Wake, and Granville Counties; emphasizes Camerons' civic, educational contributions to State's growth, institutions of higher learning; courtly language, thoroughly favorable review of important Tar Heel family; interesting insight into life-style of what was the wealthiest family in North Carolina for many years; photographs and maps

Schenck, Carl Alwin. THE BIRTH OF FORESTRY IN AMERICA: BILTMORE FOREST SCHOOL, 1898-1913. Appalachian Consortium, 1974. 224 p. \$4.50 paper. shs

Important for its insight into concept of forest conservation, brainchild of a German forester "imported" by George Vanderbilt to manage his forest estate, Biltmore; first-person narrative by Schenck, whose devotion to preserving America's forest lands finally caught on in mid-20th century industrial forestry program

Schumann, Marguerite E. THE FIRST STATE UNIVERSITY--A WALKING GUIDE. U. of N.C. Pr., 1972. 85 p. \$1.45 paper. jhs shs

Tour guide to UNC-CH campus, covering 53 buildings, 9 other campus cites, as well as residences; guide confined to easy, one-hour walks in vicinity of McCorkle Place and Polk Place, heart of old campus; buildings described pictorially and in entries under black-and-white photos; interesting anecdotes about buildings, persons for whom named, etc.; indexed

Shaw, Sharon. AUCTIONS. Blair, 1977. 51 p. \$3.95 paper. shs

Free verse by Sandhill's Community College instructor; many poems inspired by Greek dramas, myths; poet's wide travel, residences in Europe, Asia, reflected in poetry noted for personal, inward searching, some sharp images; not rhythmical or flowing, but interesting; for highly motivated creative writers

Pictorial and written presentation of American mountain people in Appalachians, Ozarks, Rockies, Cascades, Sierras; filled with photographs, many in brilliant color, some old ones in black and white; text vividly describes areas, people, customs; so well done that it leaves readers with special feeling for the hardy stock of Americans who inhabit mountain regions

Sprunt, James. TALES AND TRADITIONS OF THE LOWER CAPE FEAR, 1661-1896. Reprint, 1973.

Facsimile reprint of 1896 edition; anecdotal account of events, people, places of Cape Fear region from colonial times through Reconstruction; most are vignettes, interestingly if quaintly related; appendix includes prominent citizens past and "present" (c. 1896), with their businesses also discussed; occasionally printing is poorly done; of regional interest for large collections

Stambler, Irwin. CATFISH HUNTER: THE THREE-MILLION-DOLLAR ARM. Putnam, 1976. 127 p. \$5.29. elem jhs shs

Biography of the famed North Carolina-country-boy-turned-big-league-pitcher; favorable, enthusiastic account; strictly text, no photos; indexed; easy reading but not high-interest/low-vocabulary format

Stem, Thad, Jr. THE TAR HEEL PRESS. N. C. Press Assn., 1973. 309 p. \$7.50. shs

Readable, entertaining history of North Carolina newspapers, tracing newspaper growth in State chronologically from James Davis's NORTH CAROLINA GAZETTE (1791) to Open Door Act of 1970's permitting reporters to sit in on legislative appropriations committee meetings; colorful vignettes, anecdotes, character sketches of events, people in North Carolina press circles, as well as a wealth of local, State, national history; especially successful in capturing flavor of each era's issues, fads, moods as reflected in State's newspapers; cites courageous N: C. newspapermen who reversed unsavory tides of opinion, brought us closer to democratic ideals; excellent reading, especially for journalism classes; a mint of information on North Carolina history; published on occasion of North Carolina Press Association's 100th anniversary

Stem, Thad, Jr., and Alan Butler. SENATOR SAM ERVIN'S BEST STORIES. Moore, 1973. 144 p. \$5.95. jhs shs

Informal interviews with Senator Sam Ervin conducted à la Johnson and Boswell; Ervin and his "interviewer" engage in witty, knowledgeable dialogue ranging from Tar Heel judges, lawyers, and villains to poetry of Job and Shakespeare; Ervin's reputed skills as a raconteur are well attested to, as are his impressive memory and erudition; in words of a British critic, the book gives us "the racy essence of living American history"; all ages will respond to these anecdotes from a revered, literate statesman of the old school

Correctional Center for Women, Sanford Advancement Center, offices of prison administrators; emphasizes overcrowded conditions, lack of discipline, inmate frustration, need for separating youthful and first offenders from hard-core prison population; appeals to State's citizenry to understand prisoners' plight, lend a hand to those returning to society, support expanded accommodations for those confined; personal interviews with inmates strengthen points; work-release programs, health care, grievance procedures, etc., explained in upbeat, positive terms; excellent color and clarity; interesting collage of faces -old, young, hard, vulnerable, black, white, defiant, closed; possibly controversial simply because the content, regardless of its persuasion, could be inflammatory with some groups, but with proper preparation beforehand and careful follow-up activities, presentation: could be excellent supplement to secondary sociology, government, law, related courses
