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## ABSTRACT

This final report describes the activities of the Asian and Pacific American Research Seminars for the first two year grant period of 1979-1981. The purpose of the project is defined as the development of the quality and quantity of research on Asian and Pacific Americans. Topics of training seminars included social policy issues, fiscal restraint legislation, grantsmanship, curriculum development and evaluation, Hawaiian educational research, and educational research issues for Asian and Pacific Americans. Research development activities carried on in conjunction with the seminars project are also outlined. A description of the content and project goals of each seminar, the vitae and publications of the principal investigators, and a directory of project consultants are appended to this report. (JCD)

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## ASIAN AND PACIFIC AMERICAN RESEARCH SEMINARS

### Final Report

The purpose of this report is to summarize the activities of the Asian and Pacific American Research Seminars (NAAPAE/RS, formerly entitled, Asian American Research Seminars) for the two year grant period 1979-1981. This project was conducted under the auspices of the National Association for Asian and Pacific American Education and was funded by a grant from the Minorities and Women's Program of the National Institute of Education (NIE-G-79-0063). A copy of the project's program announcements for fiscal year 1980-1981 appears in the appendix.

The purpose of the project was to develop the quality and quantity of educational research on Asian and Pacific Americans (APA). In order to accomplish these goals the project conducted a series of training seminars and other activities during the past two years. This report will outline accomplishment of the program.

### 1979-1980 PROGRAMS

During the 1979-1980 fiscal year, NAAPAE/RS organized three training seminars and conducted five research development activities. The three training seminars included a social policy seminar, a fiscal restraint legislation seminar, and a grantsmanship training workshop. Research development activities included a set of contracted papers, a National Scholar Awards Program, the NAAPAE/RS Mentors Program, the development of a resource bank of Asian and Pacific American researchers and the development of an APA library collection. Each of these seminars and activities is described briefly below. More detail summary of 1979-1980 activities can be found in the 1979-1980 project year-end report submitted to the National Institute of Education in October, 1980.

#### Training Seminars

The Impact of Fiscal Restraint Policies on APA Studies. The first training seminar conducted by the project was held in Los Angeles, California, on April 19, 1980. The seminar focused on the impact of fiscal restraint policies on APA studies, and was organized for directors of Asian and Pacific American studies programs. The subject of this seminar was very timely, since fiscal restraint in government activities has become more and more usual, and may have a serious impact on those interested in ethnic studies in the United States.

The coordinator of this seminar was Dr. Don Nakanishi. Dr. Nakanishi is a Ph.D. in political science from Harvard University and is at present a Research Associate at the Asian American Studies Center at UCLA. His area of expertise is education decision making and education equity.

As a result of this conference, Dr. Nakanishi prepared a paper which he delivered at the second annual meeting of NAAPAE. This paper was delivered to NIE in October, 1980.

Social Policy Issues in Asian American and Pacific Island Education. On April 24, 1980, in Washington, D.C., the project conducted a seminar on social policy issues. The purpose of this seminar was to expose APA educators to the social policy issues facing Asian and Pacific American children and families. The seminar was organized and chaired by Dr. Kenyon S. Chan.

The time and place of the seminar coincided with the second annual meeting of the National Association for Asian and Pacific American Education. Papers were presented by the following people:

Over 50 APA educators attended the seminar. These educators represented a wide variety of professionals, including teachers, researchers, clinicians and social policy analysts. The discussion which followed the paper presentations indicated that APA researchers were in great need of additional information and training in social policy research. Many participants in the audience suggested that a more intensive social policy training effort should be organized. In response to these concerns we proposed an intensive social policy training seminar for the second year of our activities.

Grantsmanship Training Workshop. From July 12 to 18, 1980, in Boston, Massachusetts, we conducted a Grantsmanship Training Workshop. The purpose of this workshop was to provide grantsmanship knowledge and skills to APA educational researchers who are in the early stages of their careers. The seminar was organized by Dr. Kenyon S. Chan and coincided with the NIE-

sponsored Summer Institute on Asian and Pacific American Educational Research.

The instructor for this workshop was Mr. Alan Kumamoto. Mr. Kumamoto was a senior associate at the Grantsmanship Center. He was responsible for program planning and development for the Grantsmanship Center and has been conducting grantsmanship workshops for over seven years.

Twenty-nine persons participated in the workshop. Participants came from every area of the United States. The workshop included fifteen hours of lectures spread over five days, and a series of out-of-class homework assignments. The workshop focused on program planning, proposal writing, proposal and agency organization, preparation of proposals, private and public funding sources, proposal evaluation and the actual preparation of a research proposal. In addition to the lecture, each participant was provided a booklet of over 200 pages of materials on different aspects of grantsmanship.

Evaluation of the workshop by participants was very positive. All those who submitted written evaluations indicated that they felt the workshop was useful, informative and greatly demystified the grants process.

#### Research Development Activities

Contracted Papers. As part of our mandate to encourage research on APA children and families, the project contracted a series of comprehensive papers on APA education. Such a series of papers was deemed necessary because presently very little research is being conducted on APA children and families. This may be due to the fact that 1) no clear problem areas or issues have been identified, 2) no clear theoretical approaches have been outlined, 3) no clear field of study has been established, and 4) a critical mass of studies on APA children and families does not exist which makes it difficult to give theoretical conceptual guidance to new research. These contracted papers serve as a catalyst for future research.

In 1980, three contracted papers were completed. The authors and papers are as follows:

Copies of these papers have been submitted to NIE previously. These papers are circulated in the hard copy by NAAPAE and in microfilm copy by the ERIC Clearinghouse for Urban Education.

National Scholar Awards. In order to promote and encourage scholarly writing on the educational concerns and issues facing Asian and Pacific Americans, the project, with the cooperation of NAAPAE, sponsored a National Awards Program. This award program was designed to enhance the prestige of research on Asian and Pacific Americans and provide a means to examine critical issues facing Asian and Pacific Americans. It also provided recognition for individuals conducting research on educational issues facing this population.

After extensive review of the submitted papers, two papers were judged equally outstanding. Therefore, two awards were presented in 1980. The first was awarded to Dr. Kathryn Au for her paper entitled, "Theory and Method in Establishing the Cultural Congruence of Classroom Speech Events." The second award was presented to Mr. D. John Lee for his paper entitled, "Counseling Across Culture: A Critique." Three copies of these papers accompany this final report.

Mentor Program. Three mentor relationships were established during the 1979-1980 fiscal year. Dr. Kenyon S. Chan was assigned as a mentor to Ms. Sandra Yuen. Ms. Yuen was a Ph.D. candidate in the early education and child development program at Stanford University. She was completing a study on ethnic self-esteem of Chinese American children. Dr. Chan regularly consulted with her in the design and analysis of her study.

Dr. Sau-Lim Tsang was assigned as a mentor to Dr. Patricia Belinde and Dr. Akemi Kikumura, both of the University of Southern California. Dr. Tsang donated his services as mentor to the project. Dr. Tsang assisted Drs. Blinde and Kikumura in the preparation of a grant aimed at training APA researchers. In particular, he assisted them in the design of the project, the design of the project's budget and management plans.

Resource Bank of APA Researchers. One of the important elements of our project was to develop a communication network among APA researchers. In order to accomplish this goal, it was necessary to develop a resource directory of researchers interested in APA children and families. The project solicited names, vitae and biographical sketches from researchers across the nation. A directory of over 240 names was submitted to NIE at the end of 1980.

APA Educational Library. As a result of a survey of several hundred educational researchers, it was determined that literature reviews and bibliographic materials on APA children and families was greatly needed. We received many requests for bibliographies on various topics related to education. Presumably these bibliographies would be used as a foundation for developing research projects.

In addition, as we collected vitae and biographies as part of the resource bank activities, we were able to collect key articles and other writings on APA education from these authors as well. Therefore, the project employed a quarter-time bibliographer for three months and assisted the Asian American Studies Center at UCLA in establishing a library collection on Asian and Pacific American education.

#### 1980-1981 PROGRAMS

In the 1980-1981 fiscal year, NAAPAE/RS organized four training seminars and conducted five research development activities. The four training seminars included the Asian American Public Policy Training Seminar, the Curriculum Development and Evaluation Seminar, the Hawaii Educational Research Seminars, I-IV and the Pacific Northwest Education Research Workshop. The research development activities included the contracted papers, the APA Educational Researchers Resource Bank, the National Scholar Award, the Guide to APA Women in California and the Selected Bibliography on APA Children and Families. Each activity is briefly described below.

#### Training Seminars

Asian American Public Policy Training Seminar. The Asian American Public Policy Training Seminar was conducted on June 26-27, 1981 at UCLA. Dr. Don Nakanishi from UCLA coordinated the seminar. The seminar featured six different training sessions involving seven speakers, who provided in-depth training on topics ranging from "The Role of Social Scientists in the Public Policy Arena" to "Social Science Research and Policy Litigation." Twelve post-doctoral educators from across the nation and representing different academic interests and ethnic backgrounds were selected for the seminar.

The training seminar accomplished its goals of providing training, understanding and guidance on both the theoretical and practical dimensions of the role of social science research in public policy formulation, deliberation and implementation. Special emphasis was placed on the role of social science research in the areas of immigration, affirmative action, housing and labor. At the same time, careful attention was paid to providing the participants with sufficient time to ask questions and exchange views during each of the sessions. These exchanges were particularly meaningful and stimulating, and clearly demonstrated the intense interest which the participants had in the training topics. Finally, it should be noted that many participants and speakers expressed strong interest in undertaking policy-related research in the future, and in coming together again for another seminar or a panel during a professional association gathering.

Curriculum Development and Evaluation Seminar. This seminar was held at Palantine, Illinois on March 20, 1981. The seminar was coordinated by Susy Chan of DePaul University and Dr. Wook Park of the National College of Education.

Approximately 50 participants attended the seminar, including 8 researchers from higher educational institutions, 6 graduate students in bilingual teacher training programs and 36 practitioners at elementary or secondary levels. Participants from Oregon, Minnesota, Ohio and Wisconsin attended the seminar. Most of the participants, however, were from the Chicago metropolitan area or down state Illinois.

Ten speakers were invited to present papers on five major topics: 1) multicultural education: meeting Asian needs through curriculum development, 2) curriculum and materials development: the state of the art, 3) criteria and strategies for curriculum evaluation, 4) curriculum adaptation at local level, and 5) research and grant opportunities.

NAAPAE/RS was the primary sponsor of this seminar. NAAPAE/RS funded four speakers: Dr. Bob H. Suzuki, Dr. Peggy Bybunghye Chang, Mr. Jose Arcellana and Ms. Linda Kolbusz. Other co-sponsoring agencies included the Midwest Bilingual Educational Service Center (BESC), Chicago Board of Education, National College of Education and Evanston-Skokie Title VII Asian Project. These agencies provided funds for additional speakers, printing, mailing, registration and other services. The seminar was a part of the Midwest Educational Conference on March 19-20, 1981. Two of the four NAAPAE consultants also made brief presentations on March 19 at the meetings of the Midwest Educational Conference. All participants were asked to evaluate the seminar. In general, most participants felt that it was a unique and stimulating opportunity for them to be involved in examining an important educational issue for APAs. Dr. Bob H. Suzuki's opening address, the panel discussion on local adaptation of curriculum materials and Dr. Mae Chu-Chang's informative session on NIE grants programs received most favorable ratings.

Hawaii Educational Research Seminars. The Hawaii Educational Research Seminars were coordinated by Dr. Morris Lai of the University of Hawaii. Four seminars were conducted in the 1980-1981 fiscal year. All seminars were designed to create interest in conducting and coordinating educational research in Hawaii. The first seminar took place on November 1, 1980 and was entitled, "What Research Says About Schooling in Hawaii." Seminar II, entitled, "Resource and Materials for Conducting Educational Research Involving APAs in Hawaii," was held in January, 1981. Seminar III, entitled, "Developing APA Educational Researchers," was held in April, 1981. Seminar IV, entitled, "Priorities and Funding Possibilities for Asian and Pacific American (APA) Educational Research," was held simultaneously with the Summer Institute for Educational Research on Asian Americans in Hawaii during July, 1981.

This series of seminars was very successful in bringing together researchers interested in investigating the problems of Asian and Pacific American children in the State of Hawaii. NAAPAE/RS has been informed by the educational leaders in Hawaii that our seminar series has helped in establishing an informal network of researchers in Hawaii and has focused greater attention on research possibilities in Hawaii, both major goals of the seminars.

Pacific Northwest APA Education Research Workshop. The Pacific North-

west APA Education Research Workshop was held on March 5-6, 1981 in Seattle, Washington. The purpose of this workshop was to provide graduate students in the Pacific Northwest region an opportunity to examine the educational research issues facing Asian Pacific Americans. The training workshop was organized by A. Barreto Ogilvie from the Department of Public Instruction, State of Washington. The workshop took place in conjunction with the annual meetings of the Washington Association for Asian and Pacific American Education. The NAAPAE/RS project provided funds for workshop registration, participant fees and consultant fees.

Participation in the workshop varied during the two-day sessions from six to twenty participants. Major workshop lectures were presented by Dr. James Morishima from the School of Education at the University of Washington, Dr. Stanley Sue from the Department of Psychology at the University of Washington and Dr. May Shih from the English Department at Washington State University. The three presenters were chosen for their expertise in their fields.

Evaluations by the participants in the workshop indicated that the presentations were well received and considered of high quality. In particular, Dr. Stanley Sue provided an interesting analysis of his research in the Chinese community. Participants considered his presentation to be among the best at the workshop.

#### Research Development Activities

Contracted Papers. Two contracted papers were prepared in 1981. The authors and papers are as follows:

APA Resource Bank. The APA Resource Bank was continued in 1981. Two hundred ninety-two names now appear in the bank. Three copies of the 1982 APA Resource Bank has been sent to NIE separately from this report (the first directory was dated 1981 although compiled in 1980).

National Scholar Award. The Second National Scholar Awards Program was conducted in 1981. Papers were solicited from across the country. A copy of the announcement is attached.

This year's award was presented to Dr. Jean Kim at the Western New England College for her paper entitled, "Development of Ethnic Identity by Japanese Women: An Exploratory Study." This paper will be distributed by NAAPAE and has been sent to NIE separately from this report.

Guide to APA Women in California. In order to promote the development of APA women researchers NAAPAE/RS collaborated with the California Asian Pacific Women's Network in the development of a resource guide to California APA women. By the end of the project period, over 100 women in various professional areas have been identified. A directory has been developed and will be elaborated by the National Asian Pacific Women's Network. Three copies of the current directory was sent to NIE separately from this report.

Bibliography on APA Children and Families. As a result of our library and bibliographic work in fiscal year 1979-1980, we published a 43 page bibliography on APA children and families. The bibliography includes abstracts of articles on education, families, mental health and social issues. Each of these major divisions are further subdivided.

Summary

In summary the two year NAAPAE/RS project accomplished a number of important goals. Through its research training seminar activities, it trained persons interested in APA problems in diverse areas, from social policy to curriculum development and evaluation. Further, the project promoted more research and attention on the educational problems facing APA populations by creating bibliographies, contracted papers, resource directories and the National Scholar Awards. As testament to the success of the project several aspects of the project will continue after the conclusion of the project and the end of the NIE support. NAAPAE plans

to continue the National Scholar Awards and the APA Resource Bank. The University of California, Los Angeles plans to continue to search for and house research literature on APA education. Finally, the National Asian Pacific Women's Network plans to expand the women's resource guide begun in 1981.

## ASIAN PACIFIC AMERICAN RESEARCH SEMINARS

The Asian Pacific American Research Seminars is a project developed by the National Association for Asian and Pacific American Education (NAAPAE) and funded by the National Institute of Education. The aim of the project is to promote educational research on Asian and Pacific Americans. The project is headquartered at the Asian American Studies Center at UCLA.

### GOALS

The goals of the project involve: 1) identifying a talent pool of researchers and developing a network of social scientists interested in educational development of Asian and Pacific Americans, 2) providing assistance to graduate students and postdoctoral researchers writing proposals for research on APA educational topics, and directing them to experts in the field for assistance, 3) holding regional and national training seminars on educational issues and professional development, and 4) encouraging and assisting minority researchers, particularly those from APA backgrounds to publish articles, present papers at scholarly meetings and generally participate in educational policy decision-making.

### PROGRAMS

#### Resource Directory

The directory contains the names, addresses, places of employment, and research interests of over 240 researchers nationwide interested in Asian Pacific American education. The resource directory is used to: 1) identify experienced researchers as potential mentors, 2) identify common training needs among researchers which can be translated into project seminars, 3) identify researchers to serve as consultants and reviewers for federal, state, and local agencies, 4) identify researchers with common research interests for the purpose of establishing communication and 5) establish a general communication network among scholars interested in APA education. Persons wishing to be listed in the directory should contact the project.

#### National Seminar Series

The seminars provide direct communication among researchers and a forum for discussion of common problems faced by researchers in con-

ceptualizing and conducting research on APA populations in the U.S. Four seminars are planned for 1980-81.

**1. The Hawaii Educational Research Seminars I-IV** will be held quarterly in Hawaii and coordinated by Morris Lai of the University of Hawaii. The seminars will focus on research issues facing APAs in Hawaii. Seminar I, What Research Says About Schooling in Hawaii, was held on November 1, 1980, in Honolulu, Hawaii. Seminar II, Resources and Materials for Conducting Educational Research Involving APAs in Hawaii, will be held in conjunction with the Hawaii Educational Research Association's Annual Meeting on January 14, 1981, in Honolulu. Seminar III, Developing APA Educational Researchers, will be held at the Sheraton Waikiki Hotel in Honolulu during the NAAPAE Annual Meeting from April 23-25, 1981. Seminar IV, Research Proposals for the Future, will be held simultaneously with the Summer Institute for Educational Research on Asian Americans, in Hilo, Hawaii during the month of July, 1981.

**2. The Northwest Research Training Workshop** will be held during the Washington Association for Asian and Pacific American Education Conference, in Seattle on March 5 and 6, 1981. This training workshop is organized by A. Berretto Ogilvie from the Department of Public Instruction, State of Washington. The workshop will examine topic areas warranting research attention and provide graduate students and others with critical skills and knowledge relative to APA research activities.

**3. The Curriculum Development and Evaluation Training Seminar** will be held at De Paul University, in Chicago on March 20, 1981. The seminar is coordinated by Susy S. Chan of De Paul University and Wook Park of the National College of Education in Chicago. Current curriculum projects and methods of evaluation will be reviewed with particular attention given to the unique problems associated with evaluating ethnic materials and the impact they have on ethnic and nonethnic children. Particular attention will be paid to bilingual materials.

**4. The Asian American Public Policy Training Seminar** will be held on May 15-17, 1981 at the Asian American Studies Center, UCLA. The seminar, which is being organized by Don Nakanishi of UCLA, will provide in-depth training on the application of

social science research to Asian American policy issues. A team of policy analysts, attorneys and social scientists will explore topics such as the preparation of policy position papers, the role of social scientists in policy-making, and the formulation of policy questions. Approximately 10 post-doctoral scholars will be selected to participate in the seminar.

For more information about any seminar please contact the project indicating the seminar of interest.

#### National Scholar Awards

During year I of the project, NAAPAE sponsored the First National Scholar Awards. The project solicited papers on APA educational problems. After an extensive review awards were presented to Dr. Kathryn Au for her paper entitled, "Theory and Methods in Establishing the Cultural Congruence of Classroom Speech Events" and to Mr. D. John Lee for his paper entitled, "Counseling Across Cultures: A Critique."

The Second National Scholar Awards will be sponsored again by NAAPAE and coordinated by the Asian Pacific American Research Seminars. An honorarium of \$500 and a certificate of recognition will be awarded to the winning papers. For further information contact the project. Deadline for papers will be September 30, 1981.

#### Mentor Program

This activity enables graduate students and post-doctoral researchers to consult with an expert in their field of study. The mentee receives short-term guidance in the design and analysis of their research problems. They may also receive help in developing proposals for funding.

## Scholar Awards Announced

The National Association for Asian and Pacific American Education (NAAPAE) announces the second awards program in Asian American and Pacific education. The purpose of the awards program is to encourage and promote scholarly writing on the educational concerns and issues facing persons of Asian or Pacific Island ancestry in the United States.

NAAPAE believes that this awards program will enhance the prestige of research on Asian and Pacific Americans, provide a means to communicate critical issues facing Asian and Pacific Americans, and provide recognition to individuals conducting research on educational issues facing Asian and Pacific Americans.

An honorarium of \$500.00 and a certificate of recognition will be awarded to the best original scholarly paper submitted to the program. Graduate students are encouraged to submit papers.

In 1980, the First National Scholar Awards were presented to Dr. Kathryn Au for her paper entitled, "Theory and Methods in Establishing the Cultural Congruence of Classroom Speech Events," and to Mr. D. John Lee for his paper entitled, "Counseling Across Cultures: A Critique."

## General Guidelines

1. "Educational concerns and issues" are broadly defined. The term "education" should not be confused with the narrow concept "schooling."
2. Submission of articles from the widest spectrum of scholars possible is encouraged. Papers dealing with, but not limited to, social policy analysis, political science, historical, or economic analysis, basic and applied psychological and educational research are encouraged. Original empirical research or new theoretical perspectives are encouraged.
3. All papers must focus on some aspect of education or have relevance to the education of persons of Asian or Pacific Island ancestry in the United States.

tion or have relevance to the education of persons of Asian or Pacific Island ancestry in the United States.

4. Comparative and international studies must have direct relevance to U.S. concerns.
5. Joint authorships are encouraged; especially between advanced and early career scholars.
6. All papers must be original works and not previously published.
7. Papers remain the property of the author(s). Although the winners may be asked to present their papers to an annual NAAPAE meeting, the author will retain full publication rights.
8. Winning papers will be selected by a panel of experts through a blind review system. The authorship of the papers will remain anonymous throughout the review process. The decision of the panel will be final.

## How to Submit a Paper

1. Manuscripts should be no longer than 30 pages double spaced plus references. Authors should adhere strictly to the format described by either the *Publication Manual* (Second Edition) of the American Psychological Association or the *University of Chicago Manual of Style* (12th Edition). Manuscripts not conforming to either of these style manuals will not be reviewed.
2. The title page should include the title of the paper, the author's name, affiliation, and address. The name of the author(s) or other identifying information should not appear in the text of the paper.
3. Send three copies of the paper to the address below.
4. Send one self-addressed, stamped post card which will be used to confirm our receipt of your paper.
5. Send one copy of your curriculum vita
6. Send a 3 x 5 index card with the following information:
