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ABSTRACT

This booklet provides the results of a review and evaluation of fellowships and institutes funded in Fiscal Year 1988 through the Library Career Training Program under Title II-B of the Higher Education Act. A total of 14 master's fellowships, 9 doctoral fellowships, and three institutes were funded, and abstracts of each are provided. Each fellowship abstract includes the name and address of the institution receiving the funding, project director, number and level of the fellowship, amount of funding, grant period and number, priorities selected, and project objective(s). Each institute abstract includes the name and address of the funded institution, project director, number of participants, amount of funding, grant period and number, length of institute, priority selected, and program objective(s). Six tables summarize the history of the Title II-B funding from 1966-1988. (EW)

## Foreword

The Library Career Training Program, Title II-B of the Higher Education Act, provides grants to institutions of higher education and library organizations or agencies to train persons in librarianship through fellowships, institutes, and traineeships and to establish, develop, and expand programs of library and information science.

Annual competitions have been held since 1966 for fellowship grants. The cumulative totals, by State and institution, are shown in table 1. To date, \$31,863,659 has been spent to support 16 bachelor's, 53 associate, 77 traineeships, 2,796 master's, 248 post-master's, and 1,091 doctoral fellowships.

During fiscal years 1968-79, institutes for training and retraining librarians were also funded under this program. No institutes were funded from 1980-86, then, in FY 87, institutes were reinstated and two were funded. This year, three institutes are being funded. A summary of the Library Training Institute Program for fiscal years 1968-79, and 1987-88, is shown on table 2.

Together, the fellowship and institute components of HEA Title II-B total \$51,114,283, which has assisted 20,544 persons in training and retraining for library service. Institutions receiving grants do not require fellows or institute participants to pay tuition and fees. Stipends for fellowships recipients (for the academic year and summer) are: master's, \$5,400; and post-master's and doctoral, \$7,400 each. For fellowships, the institution receives an amount equal to the stipend, to cover the cost of training and the cost of waiving tuition and fees.

The cost of institutes varies according to the length of time, the number of participants, grantees' costs for personnel, support services, and other administrative costs.

Persons interested in receiving a fellowship or in attending an institute should apply directly to the grantee institution, which has the sole responsibility for selecting recipients or participants, as indicated in sections 776.2 and 776.3 of the program regulations.

This booklet is the result of review and evaluation of highly competitive applications for fellowships and institutes. It brings together abstracts of each project funded in fiscal year 1988. It has been prepared for use by librarians, counselors, and prospective students of library and information science seeking information about the projects funded under Title II-B of the Higher Education Act.

On behalf of the United States Department of Education, Office of Educational Research and Improvement, we wish to thank the applicants for submitting well-written and carefully planned project applications, the peer reviewers for their time and effort in reviewing and evaluating these applications, and the staff, Yvonne Carter, Zondra Carroll, Delores Love, Angela Miles, Janice Owens, and Viola Woolen for preparation of the booklet.

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## Introduction

The Library Career Training Program Final Regulations published in the *Federal Register* on May 26, 1988, introduced six priorities to which applications may be directed:

- (1) To train or retrain library personnel in areas of library specialization where there are currently shortages, such as school media, children's services, young adult services, science reference, and cataloging.
- (2) To train or retrain library personnel in new techniques of information acquisition, transfer, and communication technology.
- (3) To increase excellence in library leadership through advanced training in library management.
- (4) To increase excellence in library education by encouraging study in librarianship and related fields at the doctoral level.
- (5) To provide advanced training in the development, structure, and management of new library organizational formats, such as networks, consortia, and information utilities.
- (6) To train or retrain library personnel to serve the information needs of the elderly, the illiterate, the disadvantaged, or residents of rural America.

The "Notice Inviting Applications," published by the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Education in the December 14, 1987, *Federal Register*, cited priorities 1, 2, 3, and 5 as the FY 88 areas for which applications were being invited. As a result of the invitation, 41 applications for fellowships and 23 for institutes were received. Some applications selected more than one priority. Priorities selected by the applicants for *fellowships* were:

- Priority 1--10 applications for training/retraining school library media specialists;  
9 applications for training/retraining persons for children and young adult library services;

- 4 applications for training librarians for science reference; and
- 2 applications for cataloging.
- Priority 2—6 applications for training or retraining in new technology.
- Priority 3—4 applications for advanced training in library leadership.
- Priority 4—3 applications for encouraging study in librarianship at the doctoral level.
- Priority 5—4 applications for advanced training in the development, structure, and management of new library organizational formats.
- Priority 6—8 applications for training or retraining library personnel to serve the information needs of the elderly, illiterate, the disadvantaged, or residents of rural America.

Priorities selected by applicants for *institute* proposals were:

- Priority 1—10 applications for training/retraining persons for children and young adult library services.
- Priority 2—0 applications for training or retraining in new technology.
- Priority 3—3 applications for advanced training in library leadership.
- Priority 4—1 application for study in librarianship at the doctoral level.
- Priority 5—0 applications for advanced training in the development, structure, and management of new library organizational formats.
- Priority 6—2 applications for training or retraining library personnel to serve information needs of the elderly, illiterate, the disadvantaged, or residents of rural America.

The FY 88 appropriation for HEA Title II-B (Library Career Training and Library Research and Demonstration) was \$718,000, with approximately \$409,000 available for training. The 41 fellowship applications requested 171 fellowships (\$1,826,982) and 23 applications for institutes (\$1,377,154), or a combined total of \$3,204,136. A group of 18 dedicated peer reviewers volunteered their time and effort to review and evaluate the 64 applications. Each application was reviewed by three persons, and the three scores were averaged. These scores were ranked from highest to lowest. Two fellowships were assigned to each application scoring 96 and above; one assigned to each of the others scoring 85 and above.

The 14 master's fellowships accounted for \$149,600, and the 9 doctoral fellowships for \$130,200, a total of \$282,800. A similar process for institutes was carried out. Three institutes scoring 90 and above were funded, for a total of \$127,076.

To train or retrain library personnel in areas of library specialization where there are currently shortages, such as school media, children's services, young adult services, science reference, and cataloging.

### **Project Objective(s)**

The Urban Library Youth Services Project will address the current shortage of librarians prepared for and committed to providing library and information services for children and young adults. A systematic course of study will consist of five core courses, three directly related to services and resources for children and young adults, and field work (internship) with an established library service program for children and young adults.
