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ABSTRACT

This Kids Count report is the third to examine the well-being of Arkansas' children and the first to provide trend information. The statistical report is based on 10 core indicators of well-being: (1) unemployment rate and per capita personal income; (2) federal and state assistance program participation rates; (3) percent of high school students in tech prep curriculum; (4) dropout rate; (5) percent births to women with less than 12 years of education; (6) teen birth rate; (7) infant mortality rate; (8) child maltreatment rate; (9) teen arrest rates; and (10) teen violent death rate. The bulk of the report provides state and county profiles. Findings indicated that approximately 25 percent of Arkansas' children live in poverty, with the number of children receiving food stamp assistance increasing from 1990 to 1995, and the percent eligible for school lunch programs increasing each year. The school dropout rate increased in 1992-93. The percent of births to teens increased from 1990 to 1994. Although the state maltreatment victim rate had been slowly declining, it increased from 1994 to 1995. There was also an increase of in juvenile arrest rates from 1989 to 1994. The teen violent death rate increased from 1990 to 1994, with motor vehicle accidents the most common cause. The report concludes with a section on indicator definitions and data sources. (KB)

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Introduction

The Children's Data Center Project is an adjunct of the Census State Data Center, located in the Arkansas Institute for Economic Advancement at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock. Our objective is to collect, process, distribute, and analyze data relating to the status of children in Arkansas. During the course of the next year, reports will be published on issues affecting Arkansas' children including analyses of relevant data. The Arkansas Kids Count Data Book is produced annually to provide you with the most recent data available. The Children's Data Center also maintains a data base containing not only the published data indicators, but also other measures. All available years are stored in the data base, beginning with the base year 1990. Customized reports, charts/maps, and data research are available.

Welcome to the 1995 Arkansas Kids Count Data Book! This year's data book is significantly different from books of the past two years in order to provide trend information and some analyses of those indicators considered critical to child well-being. The section on Planning and Development Districts is eliminated, but regional summaries can be produced upon request. A section has been added on ten core indicators which were identified as the most important factors affecting the well-being of children. For data users who are interested in how a particular county compares to the state and to other counties, a table is included which presents the latest available data for all the indicators in a spread-sheet format.

The information in the Data Book attempts to show the status of children in the state of Arkansas as measured by demographic, socioeconomic, educational, health, and safety indicators. The data items have been suggested by the members of the Arkansas Kids Count Technical Advisory Committee who represent various agencies that work with or provide services to the children of the state. The data supplied to the Children's Data Center by the various state agencies came from both published reports and unpublished sources and was provided in electronic format and paper copy. Even though every attempt has been made to assure the accuracy of the data, the agencies, who also provided definitions and sources to cite, remain the final authority on the quality and meaning of the data.

The 1995 Data Book is divided into five sections:

- ♦ Core Indicators
- ♦ State Profile
- ♦ County Profiles
- ♦ Data Table
- ♦ Definitions and Sources

On the profile pages, the demographic section describes the population and family relationships and is drawn from the 1980 and 1990 Census of Population. The other indicators for the state and the counties show data from either calendar years 1990 through 1994, school years 1989/90 through 1994/95, or state fiscal years 1991 through 1995.

Definitions and sources included are for the data published in the 1995 Kids Count Data Book. Unless otherwise noted, "children" means all children under age 18.

Core Indicators

Core Indicators: An Introduction

The core indicators for this year's Arkansas Kids Count Data Book are those measurement indicators which are considered to be most indicative of the well-being of Arkansas' children and families, while at the same time providing a yearly measurement of our progress. Most, but not all, of the core indicators have trend data. For some indicators, this is not possible. Given the importance of monitoring trends, in the future every effort will be made to collect, maintain, and publish trend data.

In reviewing the core indicators, it should be noted that some supporting data are not provided in the state and county profiles.

Children who are considered at-risk tend to be reflected in or are directly affected by one of the following core indicators as presented by the *1995 Kids Count Data Book*, produced by The Annie E. Casey Foundation: percent low birth-weight babies; infant mortality rate; child death rate; number of births to unmarried teens per 1,000 females ages 15-19; juvenile violent crime arrest rate; percent 16-19 year-old who are high school dropouts; percent of teens not attending school and not working; teen violent death rate; percent of children in poverty; and percent of families with children headed by a single parent.

One measure, poverty, which seems to be very important to the well-being of children and families due to the direct and indirect linkages to other important indicators of well-being, has not been included as a core indicator. It has been excluded due to the inability of providing this measurement each year for Arkansas with data for each county, or characteristics such as age. The following discussion on poverty provides 1992 national data from the Bureau of the Census and 1990 Census data for Arkansas.

Poverty tends to be a common factor with at-risk children and often seems to be a contributing factor to other indicators of well-being. Poverty is closely linked to a number of undesirable outcomes in areas such as health,

education, emotional well-being, and delinquency.

The child poverty rate in the United States is well above that of most other developed nations. One study found that the child poverty rate in the United States was higher than any of the seven other industrialized countries examined (Sweden, Switzerland, Norway, Germany, Canada, United Kingdom, and Australia). It was more than twice as high as child poverty in four of these countries. The relatively high child poverty rate in the United States is usually attributed to lower levels of government assistance for the needy. (Palmer, John L., Timothy Sneed, and Barbara Boyle Torrey, 1988, *The Vulnerable*, p96)

The National Center for Children in Poverty determined that from 1987 to 1992, the number of poor children rose from five to six million - a very large increase for our youngest and most vulnerable.

Characteristics of Poor Children Under 6 and Their Families, 1992

- More than 10 million children lived in low-income families
 - 26% poverty rate
 - More than double the rate for adults aged 18-64
 - Double the rate for people 65 and over
 - Substantially higher than the rate for older children
- 55% were either black or Hispanic
 - NonHispanic black and Hispanic much more likely to be poor
- More likely to have unmarried mothers
 - Odds of being poor increase for children living with unmarried mothers who are least likely to be working full-time
 - 18% lived with unmarried mothers who worked full-time or with married parents, at least one of which held a full-time job
- More likely for highest poverty rates to be in urban areas
- Less than 1/3 of poor parents with these children rely exclusively on public assistance.

According to the Bureau of the Census
• Children and the elderly were less likely to exit poverty than nonelderly adults in 1992;

Economic Security Indicators

- ♦Children were more likely than other age groups to become poor;
- ♦Children were much more likely to be poor all of 1991 and 1992 than nonelderly adults, 8.5% versus 3.2%;
- ♦Children accounted for 48.1% of the chronically poor, and were considered poor on a long-term basis.

Between 1993 and 1994, the poverty rate for persons under 18 declined significantly, from 22.7 percent to 21.8 percent. This age group, however, still has a higher level of poverty than other age groups. There was also a decline in both the poverty rate (12.3 percent to 11.6 percent) and the number of poor families (8.4 million to 8.1 million) in the U.S.

"In 1992, over two million poor children under six lived in married-couple families. Children living in married two-parent families benefit from having two parents who can contribute income from employment. Young children with better-educated parents are much less likely than others to be poor, but high school graduation is not enough. Better-educated parents are more likely to be employed and to earn enough to avoid poverty. Additionally, while public assistance does not guarantee that families will not be poor, and while the Earned Income Tax Credit helps families in poverty, the poverty gap is not closed entirely." *Young Children in Poverty: A Statistical Update*, National Center for Children in Poverty, December 1994.

What about Arkansas?

According to the Bureau of the Census, the total number of Arkansans living in poverty in 1990 was 437,089. Of that number, 155,399 were children 0-17 years of age (25.3 percent compared to 17.9 percent nationally for all children of this age). The number of children under six was 55,414 or 12.7 percent of the total Arkansans living in poverty compared to 6.8 percent nationally. **Children, 0-17 years of age, represented about 36 percent of Arkansans living in poverty in 1990, while their parents or guardians numbered among the 206,065 Arkansans aged 18-64**

(about 47 percent of all Arkansans) living in poverty in 1990. Children and their families numbered among the majority of Arkansans living in poverty in 1990.

While annual population estimates, including poverty information, are available each year from the Current Population Survey for the population as a whole, an age breakdown is not available.

Children at-risk generally are reflected in more than one indicator's data set and therefore are less likely to have desirable outcomes. While Arkansans must be concerned about risks to children, indicators should never be read as determinants of children's futures. "Personal resilience, supportive family and friends, and linkages to community resources make a critical difference, doing much to alleviate the effects of poverty, abuse and lack of a formal education." Additionally, "the absence of any obvious risk indicators in a child's life should not be read as a certain 'all clear' sign. Children born into material comfort and stable families are also subject to illness, isolation, developmental problems, violence, and early parenthood." (*Minnesota Kids Count*, 1994 Report, p18)

The ten core indicators have been grouped into three sections: Economic Security Indicators, At Risk Indicators, and Children in Danger Indicators. Included in the Economic Security Indicators are unemployment, per capita personal income, assistance programs, and tech prep. The measurements included as At Risk Indicators include high school dropout rate, percent births to women with less than 12 years of education, and the teen birth rate (ages 10-17). Children in Danger Indicators include infant mortality rate, child maltreatment (ages 0-17), teen arrest rates (ages 10-14, 15-17), and teen violent death rate (ages 15-17).

The measurements included in Economic Security Indicators have either a direct or an indirect effect on determining whether children will become statistics reflected in the At Risk Indicators, or ultimately, as statistics in the Children in Danger Indicators.

Unemployment Rate and Per Capita Personal Income

Definitions:

Unemployment Rate: The number of unemployed workers as a percentage of the civilian labor force (included are those persons working or actively seeking employment).

Per Capita Personal Income: The total personal income of the residents of a given area divided by the resident population of the area.

The indicators placed in the Economic Security Indicators category include Unemployment Rate; Per Capita Personal Income; Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC); Food Stamps; School Lunch; Women, Infants, and Children's Program (WIC); and Tech Prep. While there are many other indicators of economic well-being, these can be measured annually over time and employment and income have a direct and strong impact on the well-being of children and families.

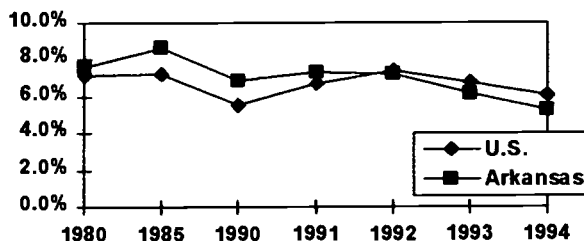
In Arkansas, as in other states, the unemployment rate and per capita income vary greatly from one part of the state to another. For instance, in 1994, the annual average unemployment rate for the state was 5.3 percent and rates for the counties ranged from a low of 2.6 percent in Benton County to a high of 11.6 percent in Ouachita County.

In 1994, the U.S. unemployment rate was 6.1 percent. While this is good news, policy makers and others need to be cautious since an unknown number of persons may not currently be reflected in any of the employment data. They may have dropped out of the employment system entirely and no longer be seeking employment.

Arkansas' low unemployment rate actually signifies a statewide labor shortage. According to a poll conducted by the Arkansas Industrial Development Commission and reported in the *Arkansas Democrat-Gazette Business Section* on September 3, 1995, "the labor shortage jumped from eighth to first among the problems listed by Arkansas manufacturers." Finding and keeping a trainable workforce is seen as the biggest headache for industries.

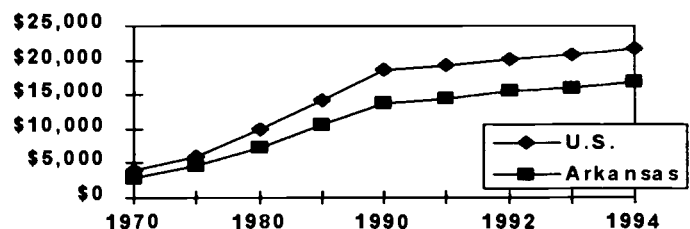
In the same article, a plant manager in Northeast Arkansas said, "There's plenty of people....but, they can't read. They don't have a work ethic or know how to be part of a team. We're in a county that had 12 percent unemployment, and we're having to interview 30 people to fill a slot." When he did hire a person, it was usually someone he would not have hired in the previous year.

Since 1992, Arkansas has had a lower unemployment rate than the nation as a whole.

States like Arkansas can experience both low unemployment and low per capita income at the same time. (In 1994, Arkansas had the second lowest per capita income in the U.S.) This would mean that while most people are

employed, they are by and large employed in low-wage, low-skilled jobs and many may be living in poverty. Since 1990, the gap between the per capita personal income of the U.S. as a whole and that of Arkansas has been slowly narrowing. Arkansas' per capita personal income was 77.5 percent of the U.S. average in 1994.

According to the Bureau of the Census, in 1993, the national median household income for a married couple was \$43,129. For a male householder with no wife present, the median income was \$29,849. The median household income for a female householder with no husband present was only \$18,545.

"Women aged 15 and over who worked year-round, full-time in 1993 earned a median income of \$21,747. This was 72 percent of their male counterparts' earnings (\$30,407).

Women without a high school diploma earned a median income of \$14,700, while comparably educated men made \$21,402. Women with high school diplomas only made \$19,168, while men made \$26,820. Women with bachelor's degrees earned \$32,291, while men earned \$45,987." (Bureau of the Census Statistical Brief, *American Women: A Profile*, July 1995)

The poverty rate in 1993 for a married couple with children was 9 percent; for a male householder with no wife present, it was 23 percent; and for a female householder with no husband present, it was 46 percent.

Of Arkansas' top ten manufacturing industries (ranked by number of employees) only one (ranked sixth), the paper industry, is paying higher wages than the national average (101.4 percent) in 1994 (100 percent equals the national average).

Again, while Arkansas may appear to have a healthy employment situation, wages may be unable to keep families out of poverty. Additionally, the employment situation may not be level with respect to age, race and perhaps other factors, such as location in the state.

Youth Unemployment

One opportunity that exists for some youth

is employment, providing additional income and assisting in their economic well-being.

According to the *1993 Kids Count Data Book*, produced by The Annie E. Casey Foundation, in 1990, 5.3 percent or 7,658 of the 144,495 Arkansas' youth, ages 16-19, were neither in school nor in the labor force. These youths are at high risk of delinquency and crime. Success as adults is also at risk, because those who spend a large share of their young adult years unemployed have a harder time getting and keeping a job later in life. Work experience at this point in life is critical.

Of the 65,946 youths ages 16-19, who were in the labor force in 1990, 19.4 percent or 12,776 were not employed. In 1990, therefore, there was a total of 20,434 additional youths who could and would have benefitted from employment in Arkansas. Many of these youths, however, need occupational training and/or employment skills to find and keep jobs.

Federal and State Assistance Programs

According to the Bureau of the Census, from 1991-1993, children had higher rates of participation in assistance programs such as public housing, Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), General Assistance, Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Medicaid, Food Stamps, and federal or state rent assistance. For the full 24 months of 1991 through 1992, 13.4 percent of all children participated in these assistance programs, while only 5.6 percent of nonelderly adults and 11.1 percent of the elderly did so. Children were also more likely to receive AFDC/General Assistance and Food Stamps on a long-term basis.

For children who were receiving food stamps, their participation continued for 11.9 months, significantly longer than the 7.6 months for nonelderly adults. Children received AFDC/General Assistance for 7.8 months, a significantly shorter period of time than the previously reported 12.5 months for the period 1990-1993.

"Median monthly family benefits were substantially higher for children than for nonelderly adults, and were higher for nonelderly adults than for the elderly." (Current Population Reports, Household Economic Studies, Bureau of the Census, July 1995, p5)

Aid to Families with Dependent Children

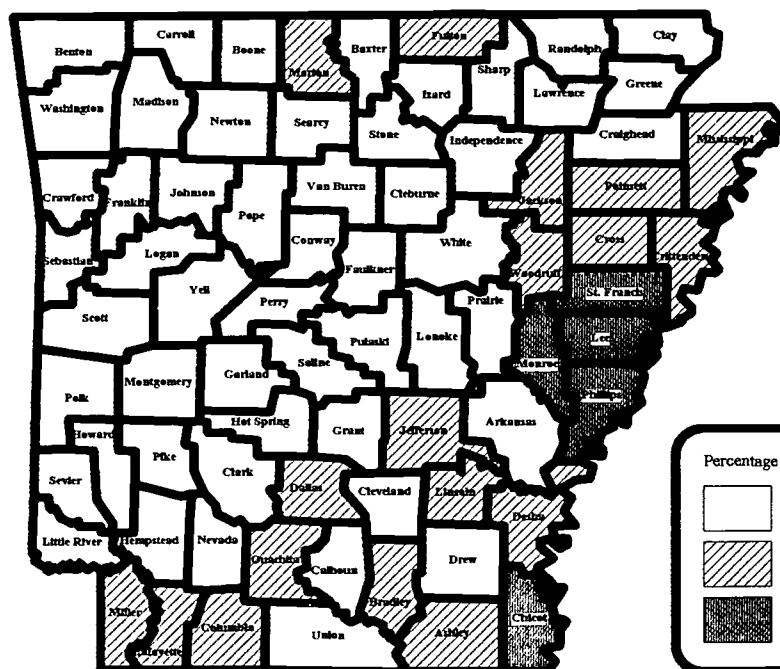
Definition: Aid to Families with Dependent Children is a program administered and funded by federal and state governments to provide financial assistance to needy families.

Nationally, in an average state, more than half (55percent) of the total costs of AFDC payments are funded by the federal government. The states provide the balance of these payments, manage the program, and determine who receives benefits and how much they get.

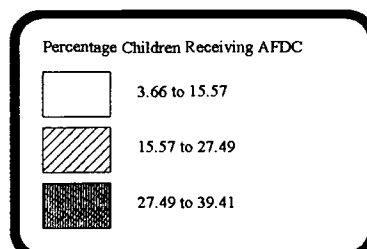
In order to be eligible to receive AFDC payments, a family must have a dependent child who is

- ♦under age 18 and living with them. (An 18 year-old who is expected to complete secondary school or its equivalent before turning 19 may also be covered).

- ♦deprived of financial support from one of its parents due to the parent's death, continued absence, or incapacity. (This includes children in two-parent families where the principal family earner is unemployed.).

- ♦a resident of the state they live in.

- ♦a U.S. citizen or an alien who is permanently and lawfully residing in the United States.

(Bureau of the Census, Statistical Brief, *Mothers Who Receive AFDC Payments*, March 1995)

On average, mothers receiving AFDC are younger (30 years) than nonAFDC mothers (34 years). They also tend to have their first child at a younger age (20 years) than nonAFDC mothers (23 years). In fact, 29 percent of the mothers on AFDC had their first child before they were 18 years of age; this was true for only 15 percent of nonAFDC mothers. AFDC mothers have an average of 2.6 children; the average for nonAFDC mothers is 2.1 children. About 48 percent of AFDC mothers have never been married, 30 percent were currently married, and the remaining 23 percent were either widowed or divorced. Of the AFDC mothers, 38 percent had completed high school and 19 percent had attended college for at least one year. "About one in seven AFDC mothers were currently enrolled in school. Only 11 percent of these students were teenagers; suggesting that a large proportion of mothers on AFDC who are enrolled in school are trying to resume their educations while raising families under severe economic circumstances." Bureau of the Census, Statistical Brief: *Mothers Who Receive AFDC Payments*, March 1995)

Nationally, most AFDC mothers (87 percent) were without employment and nearly 75 percent of mothers on AFDC lived in families with monthly incomes of less than \$1,000. About 80 percent of AFDC mothers were below the poverty level. Additionally, about 81 percent of AFDC mothers live in metropolitan areas, with about 70 percent of that number residing in central cities.

Food Stamps

Definition: The federal Food Stamp Program is designed to provide nutrition to low income individuals and households through the use of coupons.

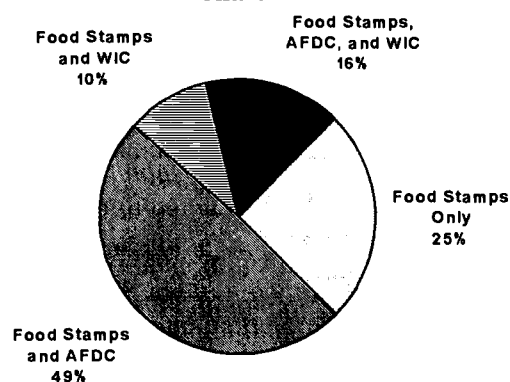
This is the most widely used public food assistance program in the country. The number of children receiving food stamps nationally has increased steadily, a 51 percent increase since 1989 with 14 million children receiving food stamps in 1993. More than half of all food stamp recipients are children. "The average size of a household receiving food stamps...was 2.6 individuals (counting children and adults)." (*The State of America's Children Yearbook*, Children's Defense Fund, 1995, p45)

In Arkansas, there was a 16 percent increase in the number of children, 186,896 to 216,783, receiving food stamps from 1990-1995.

"Three in four mothers on food stamps also receive other welfare benefits." (Bureau of the Census, Statistical Brief, *Mothers Who Receive Food Stamps*, August 1995)

Chart 3 depicts the "percent distribution of mothers 15 to 44 years old receiving food stamps by government assistance programs they participated in" during the summer 1993.

"Research shows that children who experience even temporary spells of malnutrition during infancy or childhood may suffer health and learning setbacks that limit their potential growth and development. Poor nutrition can retard physical growth, brain development, and cognitive functioning permanently." (*The State of America's Children Yearbook*, Children's Defense Fund, 1995, p46)

School Lunch

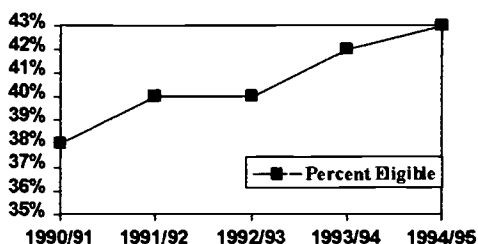
Definition: The National School Lunch Program is an entitlement program providing nutritious meals to children at participating schools. Meals provided by the schools must meet specific nutritional requirements in order for the school to qualify for federal funds.

USDA research shows that children who participate in school lunch have better nutritional intake than those who do not. For some children, a school meal is their only nutritious meal of the day. Children from low income families depend on the School Lunch Program for one-third to one-half of their nutritional intake each day. Undernutrition during any period of childhood can have detrimental effects on a child's cognitive development. The longer a child's nutritional and developmental needs go unmet, the greater the risk of cognitive impairment.

To receive a reduced price meal, household income must be below 185 percent of the federal poverty level. For free meals, household income must fall below 130 percent of poverty. Children living in households receiving food stamps or AFDC are automatically eligible for free meals.

In Arkansas, according to the Arkansas Department of Education, the percent eligible for the free/reduced lunch program continues to increase each year, from 38 percent in 1990/91 to 43 percent in 1994/95.

Women, Infants, and Children's Program: Significance and Certification

Definition: The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) is a preventative program providing nutritious food, nutrition education, and improved access to health care. This is not an entitlement program.

This federally funded program serves pregnant, postpartum, and breast feeding women, infants and children less than five years of age who are at nutritional risk, based on abnormal weight gain during pregnancy, iron-deficiency anemia or other specific health risks. Household income must be below 185 percent of the poverty level. In 1994, WIC served 6.5 million women, infants and children nationally, about 72 percent of those eligible for the program.

In Arkansas, there were 122,575 WIC certifications in 1994, and 66.2 percent of those were at or below poverty.

According to the Carnegie Corporation report, *Starting Points: Meeting the Needs of Our Youngest Children* (1994), research indicates that WIC prevents health problems in pregnant women and young children and is cost-effective.

WIC links the distribution of food to other health services, including prenatal care. Participation in WIC reduces by 15 to 25% the chance that a pregnant woman will deliver a premature or low birthweight infant. The greatest cost-savings associated with the WIC program occur during the first year of life due to reduced medical costs. **Every \$1 spent on WIC is estimated to save \$3 in medical costs.**

WIC increases the likelihood that women will receive early, regular prenatal care and that their children will get regular pediatric care and immunizations. Mothers and children who are poor, minority, or poorly educated benefit most.

WIC has been shown to protect infants and children from nutrition-related health problems during critical periods of growth and development. By protecting a child's cognitive development, WIC results in savings for special education that may have been otherwise incurred due to malnutrition in infancy and early childhood.

Definition: A course of study for secondary students that will provide the base of knowledge that students will need to enter post secondary technical education or to embark upon a variety of technical careers.

In response to reports such as *A Nation at Risk*, which studied education in the United States, state education agencies banded together in consortia to direct the creation of four new "basic" courses which would be taught in high school. These courses teach by allowing students to do. The four applied courses are Principles of Technology, Applied Math, Applied Biology/Chemistry, and Applied Communications. Applied courses teach skills in the context of real-life application. Studies about learning find that this practical hands-on method is the most effective way of teaching many students. Vocational education also teaches students critical thinking and problem solving skills, teamwork, and adaptability.

The Southern Region Education Board Consortium of States, of which Arkansas is a member, began a project in 1987 that had as a goal to raise the basic competencies of high school vocational students in math, science, and communications. Academic gains by vocational students enrolled in these applied academic courses have been documented in the project. This program of study is known as Tech Prep.

Vocational education prepares students for 80 percent of the occupations that the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics predicted will account for the largest number of jobs by 1995. National research shows that nearly 70 percent of all the jobs that will be created between now and the year 2000 will require education beyond high school. Only 4 percent of the new jobs can be filled by people with the lowest skill levels, and these jobs will offer low salaries and little chance for advancement.

Eighty percent of all U.S. jobs do not require a college diploma, but they do demand

skills provided by vocational education. Of the 20 fastest-growing occupations and the 20 largest occupations projected for the year 2000 by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, 32 of the 40 require vocational education preparation.

A study of 3,000 high school graduates in 1,000 schools found that noncollege-bound students who took at least four vocational courses in their last three years of high school enjoyed an 8 percent higher wage rate, earned 47 percent more income and were 23 percent more likely to be employed than their nonvocational peers.

A 1986 study shows that dropout-prone high school students who end up staying in school tend to earn more vocational credits than their peers who leave school. The same study, looking at people who actually dropped out, found that the number of dropouts who were once in a high school vocational curriculum is significantly less than the number of dropouts who were not.

Tech Prep curriculum is equivalent to the College Prep curriculum. Students who complete the Tech Prep program will have all the courses required for college admission, so students can change goals after high school and enroll in college. In addition, these students will be eligible to apply for the Academic Challenge Scholarship, and while in high school, they will be eligible for honor society membership and for graduation distinctions such as valedictorian, salutatorian and honor graduate.

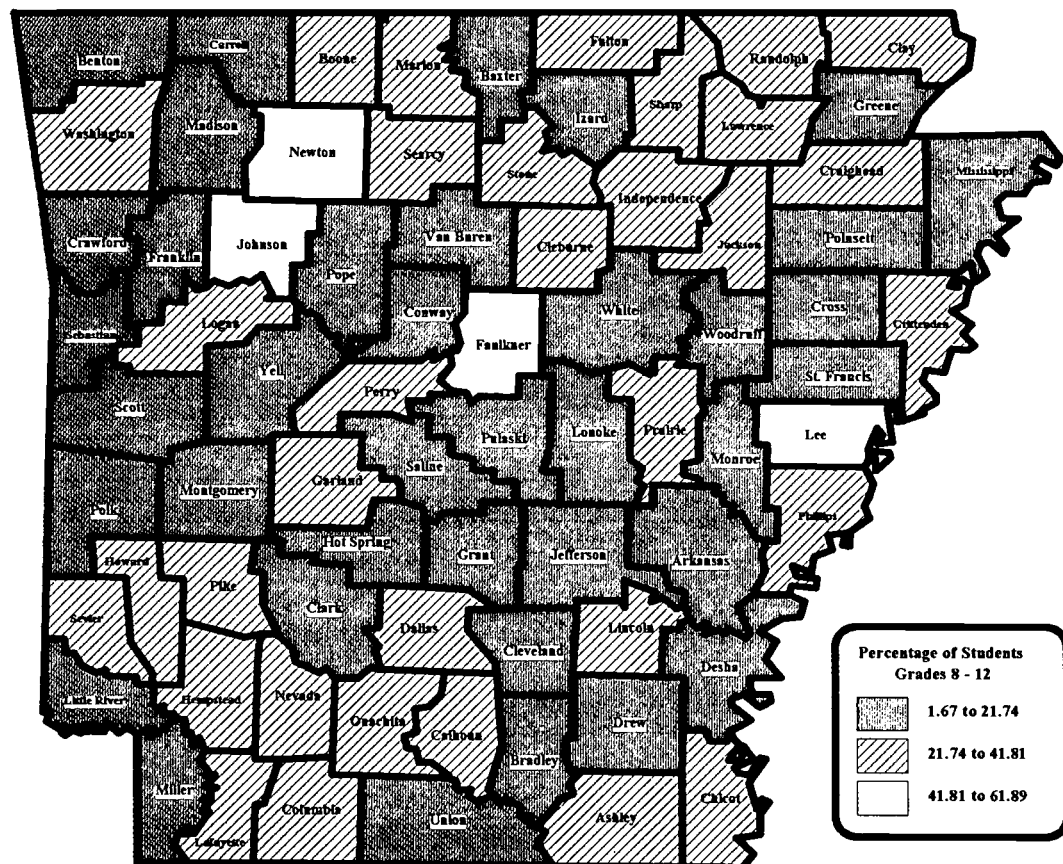
What About Arkansas?

During the 1994-1995 school year, there were 20.9 percent of students enrolled in grades 8-12 who have declared Tech Prep as their course of study. Newton County, which has strong leadership supporting Tech Prep, had the highest percentage of students in the state enrolled in Tech Prep (68.9 percent).

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High School Dropout Rate

Definition: The number of students dropping out in grades 7-12 from October 31 of one school year through October 31 of the next school year (current year), divided by the number of students enrolled in grades 7-12 as of October 1 of the current year.

According to *Goals 2000: The National Education Goals, A World Class Education For Every Child*, the high school graduation rate will increase to at least 90 percent by the year 2000. The Bureau of the Census reports that "In 1990, about 11 percent of the nation's 16-19 year olds were high school dropouts; that is, they were not enrolled in school, and they were not high school graduates. For states, the proportions ranged from 5 percent in North Dakota to 15 percent in Nevada.

In both 1970 and 1980, 13 percent of this age group were dropouts." The *1995 Kids Count Data Book* (produced by The Annie E. Casey Foundation) reports that "9.3 percent of teens ages 16-19 were dropouts in 1992, a decrease of 11 percent since 1985; however, the share of dropouts actually rose in 14 states between 1985 and 1992."

Younger workers are much better educated than the older population they are replacing in the workforce. "In 1990, persons 25-34 years old boasted 84 percent high school graduates and 23 percent bachelor's degrees, compared with 45 percent high school graduates and 10 percent bachelor's degrees for persons 75 years and older. Fifty years earlier, in the 1940 census, only 36 percent of persons 25-34 years old were high school graduates, and 6 percent had bachelor's degrees." (Bureau of the Census, September 1994)

"With increased educational attainment comes increased earnings. The average 1989 earnings of workers with only a high school diploma were 59 percent of the earnings for workers who had earned a bachelor's degree. Workers with some college but not a degree earned 11 percent more or 70 percent of those with a college degree." (Bureau of the Census, September 1994)

High school graduation is critical in pursuing post-secondary education or getting a job. Teens who drop out of high school have an extremely difficult time achieving financial success in life. In any given year, the likelihood of slipping into poverty is about three times greater for high school dropouts than for those who have finished high school; and while high school dropouts may intend to obtain a GED, only a small share actually do so.

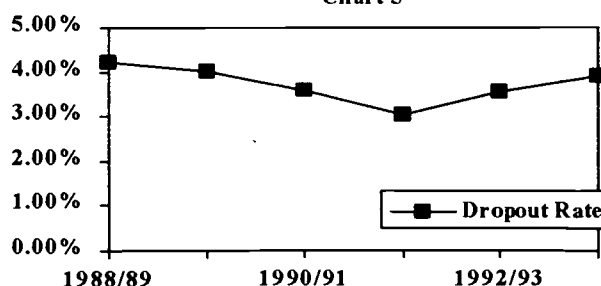
"Over a lifetime, high school dropouts will earn only 75 percent as much as high school graduates, and less than half of what college graduates are likely to make. Since economic success for males is closely linked to stable families, young males dropping out of high school inhibit the formation of stable two-parent families. The economic costs of dropping out are clear. Since 1970, the real income (income adjusted for inflation) of adults who have a high school diploma or less has fallen dramatically, while the real income of college graduates has increased." (1995 Kids Count Data Book, The Annie E. Casey Foundation, p13)

Jobs in the 21st century will require advanced skills and technical knowledge, so those who have limited education and skills will have dismal prospects and this situation is likely to worsen over time.

What About Arkansas?

From the 1988/89 school year through the 1991/92 school year, the dropout rate for the state decreased. In 1992/93, however, the trend reversed.

Percent Births - Women with Less Than 12 Years Education

Definition: The percentage of all births to Arkansas residents who have fewer than 12 years of formal education.

"Teenage mothers and fathers of babies are often undereducated, in addition to being young and unmarried." The current nature of our economy, and that which is predicted for the future, dictates that those with low educational attainment will have increased difficulty in keeping and maintaining a job and will earn low wages. "These parents will have to struggle to provide the economic and human resources that lead to successful child development." (1995 Kids Count Data Book, The Annie E. Casey Foundation, p12) They will more than likely, along with their children, live in poverty.

"The pregnant mother without a high school degree is more likely to be a teen, smoke during pregnancy and engage in other

behaviors which could be detrimental to her unborn child, and less likely to get early and complete prenatal care. This young mother is more likely to experience complications during pregnancy and at birth which could be detrimental to her unborn child resulting in low birth weight" and the extraordinary costs associated with those births. (1995 Kansas Kids Count Data

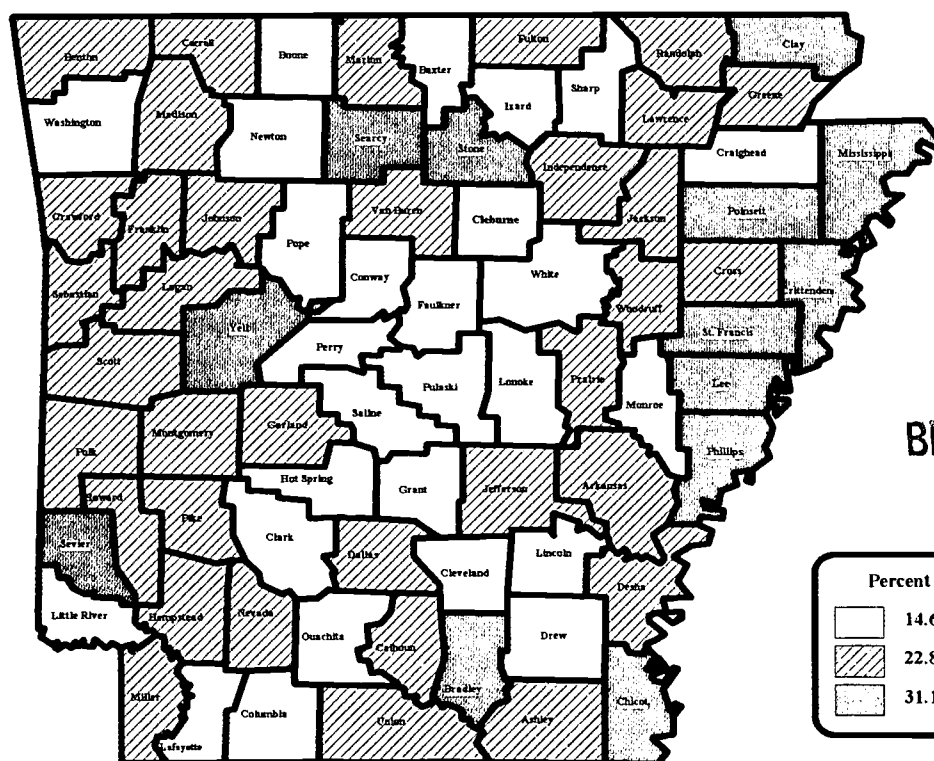
Book, p30)

Teen mothers often have difficulty in completing high school and acquiring the skills necessary to get and keep a job, which could assure their economic well-being and that of their children.

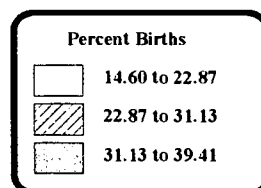
The children born to these mothers often face extreme barriers to their own long-term success: they are more likely to live in poverty, become teen parents themselves, and "are less likely to experience academic success than those whose mothers have a high school degree."

(1995 Kansas Kids Count Data Book, p30)

Percent of All Births To Teens (Ages 10-17)

Definition: The percentage of all births to Arkansas residents age 10-17.

Children having children is particularly problematic because it diminishes the opportunities of both the child and the parents. Teenage mothers and fathers are often unmarried, undereducated, much more likely to have grown up in economically disadvantaged families, come from inner city neighborhoods or isolated rural communities, and are medically disadvantaged. They are also more likely to have lower academic achievements and aspirations.

"By age 23, nationally, only 65% of teen fathers have completed high school, including General Educational Development (GED) recipients, compared to 85% of other young men. Given the changing nature of our economy, parents with low educational attainment are likely to have an increasingly difficult time in the labor force." (1995 Kids Count Data Book, The

Annie E. Casey Foundation, p12)

Unmarried 15 to 19 year-olds who give birth seldom receive adequate support from the fathers of their children, and will have to "struggle to provide the economic and human resources that lead to successful child development." (1995 Kids Count Data Book, The Annie E. Casey Foundation, p12)

Nationally, the poverty rate for single-parent families is 42 percent, compared to 8 percent for two-parent families.

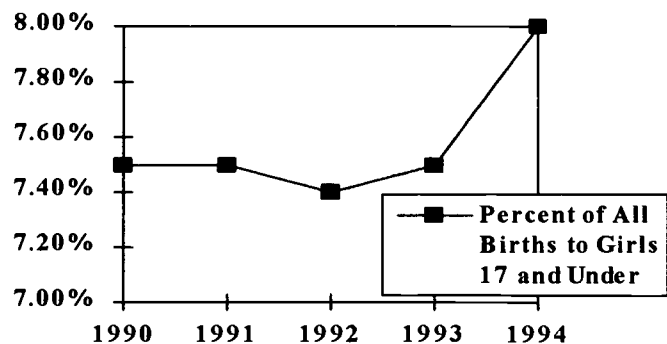
The children who are born to unmarried teenage mothers will have real difficulty in developing the resources they need to become independent, productive, and well-adjusted adults. Children of teen mothers are more likely to be victims of child abuse and neglect. "Research shows that children born to single teenage mothers are more likely to dropout of school, to give birth out of wedlock, to divorce or separate, and to be dependent on welfare," repeating the parent's cycle. "A child born to an unmarried teen-age high school dropout is ten times as likely to be liv-

ing in poverty" as one born to a mother with none of these characteristics. (1995 Kids Count Data Book,

The Annie E. Casey Foundation, p12)

According to the article, "Babies and You Program Can Save Your Business Money," which appeared in the Summer 1995 edition of *Babies and Your Business*, "the average cost of a delivery of a full-term, healthy baby is about \$3,000. The average cost of a low birthweight baby (one weighing under 5.5 pounds or 2,500 grams) is \$30,000" and "healthcare costs throughout the first year of that baby's life can easily reach \$150,000." Prenatal care for teen mothers constitutes a critical intervention for a population at risk and reduces medical costs. The most common problems with premature babies are respiratory distress syndrome which may require a ventilator or oxygen hood and sepsis, an infection of the bloodstream. **Every \$1 invested in preventive care during pregnancy may save \$3.38 in high tech intensive care following birth, as well as in additional costs later for special education, mental health, and health care.**

Children in Danger Indicators

Infant Mortality Rate

Definition: The number of deaths occurring to infants under one year of age per 1,000 live births.

The first year of life is much more tenuous than later years of childhood and therefore negative social conditions such as poverty and an unhealthy environment will have a big impact on children under one year of age. Children who die in their first year of life are reflected in the infant mortality rate.

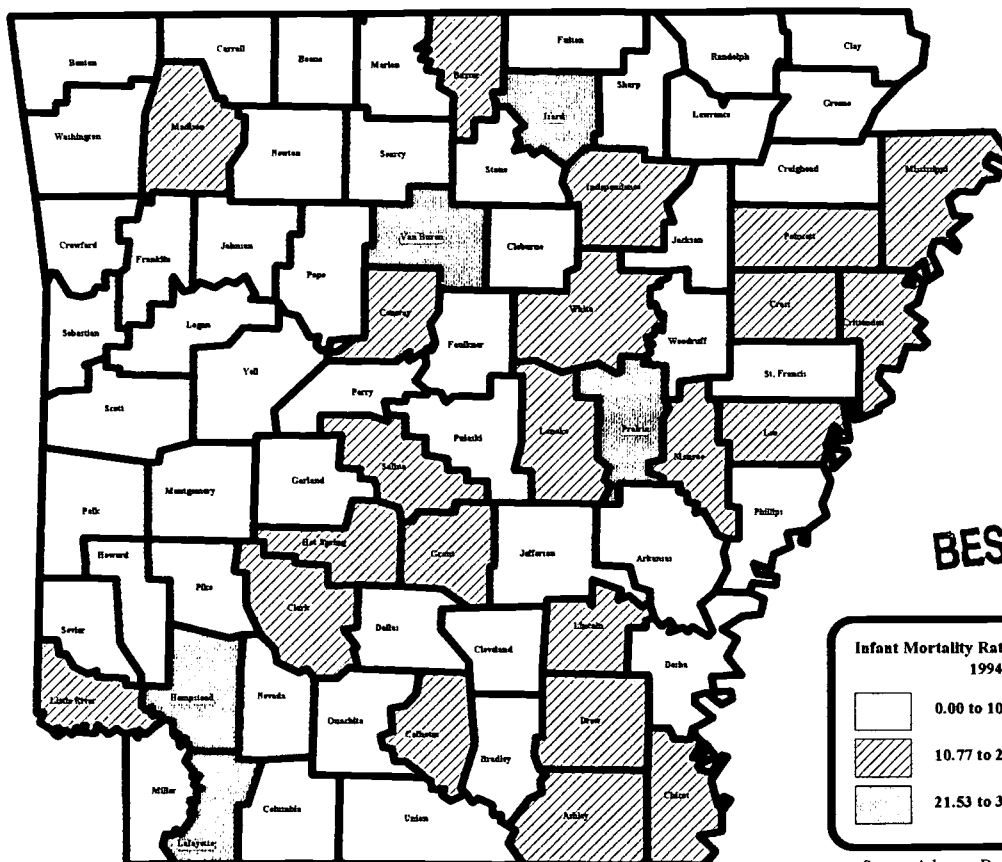
There were 34,628 infant deaths in the United States in 1992. "Due largely to improvements in medical technology, the U.S. infant mortality rate declined from 10.6 deaths per 1,000 live births in 1985 to 8.5 deaths per 1,000 live births in 1992." (*1995 Kids Count Data Book*, The Annie E. Casey Foundation, p11)

Every state experienced this decline. Although the U.S. infant mortality rate has been falling, "there are still 22 countries that have lower infant mortality rates than the United States." (*Ibid.*, p11)

"Children born to families with fewer advantages are more likely to experience health problems at an early age. For example, the infant mortality rate of African Americans remains more than twice that of whites." (*Ibid.*, p11)

"Communities where there is a confluence of several problems, such as poverty, unemployment, and illiteracy, tend to have higher infant mortality rates. One reason for the high infant mortality rate in poor neighborhoods is that residents there are less likely to receive neonatal intensive care." (Howell, Embry Martin, and Paul Vert. 1993, pp.464-469)

Child Maltreatment Rate (Ages 0-17)

Definition: The rate of children for whom an allegation of maltreatment has been founded (substantiated) per 1,000 children.

While the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act was enacted by the U.S. Congress in 1974 establishing a set of uniform operating standards with respect to the identification and management of child abuse cases, individual states continue to determine definitions of maltreatment, investigative procedures, service systems, and data collection procedures. Types of abuse include physical abuse (cuts, bruises, welts, burns/scalding, bone fractures, internal injuries), sexual abuse (sexual contact, sexual exploitation), and/or neglect (inadequate supervision and environmental neglect, such as lack of food, adequate clothing, or shelter).

According to an April 1995 report, *Current Trends in Child Abuse Reporting and Fatalities: The Results of the 1994 Annual Fifty State Survey*, commissioned by The National Committee to Prevent Child Abuse, it was estimated that 47 out of every 1,000 children in the U.S., in 1994, were reported for abuse and/or neglect to public social service/child protective services agencies. Approximately 26 percent were reported for physical abuse, 11 percent for sexual abuse, 45 percent for neglect, 3 percent for emotional abuse, and 15 percent for other situations. Approximately 1,036,000 children or 33 percent of those reported for services (16 per 1,000 U.S. children) were confirmed as victims of maltreatment: 21 percent were for physical abuse; 11 percent for sexual abuse; 49 percent for neglect; 3 percent for emotional abuse; and 16 percent for other.

The report went on to say that children who have been abused or neglected are significantly more likely to commit crimes as juveniles or adults. "It is also linked to poor academic performance, juvenile delinquency, and teenage pregnancy."

The 1993 *KidsCount in Colorado* asserted, "Children learn through their life experiences."

Recent research confirms that the following will more than likely occur:

- ♦ children who are neglected or abused learn that this is an acceptable way to be a parent, and they become abusive parents;
- ♦ young girls who are sexually abused become teenage mothers;
- ♦ children who experience neglect or abuse learn that violence is an acceptable way of problem-solving, and engage in violent behavior as children and adults; and
- ♦ children who experience neglect or abuse are later victimized as adults.

The lessons children learn will be the ones they teach as parents. Knowledge can be the vehicle of change."

Children may suffer from child maltreatment regardless of their racial or ethnic background or socioeconomic status. Children are at increased risk for maltreatment if their parents or caregivers are experiencing multiple problems such as drug and alcohol abuse, mental illness, emotional stress, poverty, unemployment, or domestic violence." (1995 Rhode Is-

land Kids Count Factbook, p52)

"This measure can be viewed as a proxy for the actual level of child maltreatment in the community. Child maltreatment is a breakdown in the normal functioning of the family that most people can agree requires special intervention to support the family and, in extreme cases which threaten the safety of the child, may require the removal of the child from the home. The child maltreatment rate can be viewed as both a demand for services and an outcome which should be directly affected by various services provided to children and families." (1995 *Kansas Kids Count Data Book*, p34)

What About Arkansas?

Since State Fiscal Year (SFY) 1990, the maltreatment victim rate per 1,000 children aged 0-17 has been slowly declining: SFY 1990's rate was 12.2 compared to 11.2 in SFY 1994. In SFY 1995, however (primarily due to better reporting methods), the victim rate increased to 13.1 per 1,000 children. The SFY 1994 rate was less than the estimated rate for the nation in 1994. (as reported in *Current Trends in Child Abuse Reporting and Fatalities: The Results of the 1994 Annual Fifty State Survey*)

Teen Arrest Rates (Ages 10-14, 15-17)

Definition: Juvenile arrest rates are calculated for all types of offenses for youths under the age of 18 per 1,000 children. The arrest rates are separated by violent crime and property crime. Violent crimes consist of murder, rape, robbery and aggravated assault. Property crimes consist of burglary, theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson.

"While being arrested is certainly a negative outcome for a young person, and juvenile crime is a concern for many citizens, caution must be exercised in interpreting this measure. Differences in these rates over time and across counties may reflect changes in police activity or public policy rather than differences in juvenile behaviors." (1995 Kansas Kids Count Data Book, p42)

According to a national report, *Juvenile Offenders and Victims*, prepared by Howard N. Snyder and Melissa Sickmund of the National Center for Juvenile Justice, August 1995, "To respond to....complex issues, juvenile justice practitioners, policymakers, and the public must have access to useful and accurate information about the system and the youth serviced by the system. Much of the information needed is currently unavailable. When the information does exist, it is often too scattered or inaccessible to be useful."

Arkansas is attempting to respond to this need for accurate and descriptive information concerning the involvement of young Arkansans in the juvenile justice system in Arkansas.

Juvenile Offenders and Victims provides the following information on juveniles involved with the justice system nationally (pp46-65):

- Most juveniles have committed at least one delinquent act.
- Black juveniles are twice as likely as white juveniles to come in contact with law enforcement.
- Most juveniles who come in contact with the juvenile justice system do so only once.
- Serious offending increases as the delinquent ages and as the career lengthens.
- A small number of juvenile offenders are chronic, or persistent, offenders.
- Less than one-half of 1 percent of juveniles in the U.S. were arrested for a violent offense in 1992.
- Some juvenile offenders continue offending as adults.
- Probability of adult arrest increases with the number of juvenile arrests.
- Serious adult offenders are likely to have more serious juvenile careers.

- Juvenile offending is less predictive of adult offending as an adult ages.
- Gun possession is common for serious juvenile offenders and some inner-city high school students.
- The growth in homicides involving juvenile offenders has surpassed that involving adults.
- Nearly one-third of juvenile murder victims are strangers.
- A growing number of juveniles kill in groups of two or more.
- One-third of juveniles entering detention centers test positive for at least one drug.

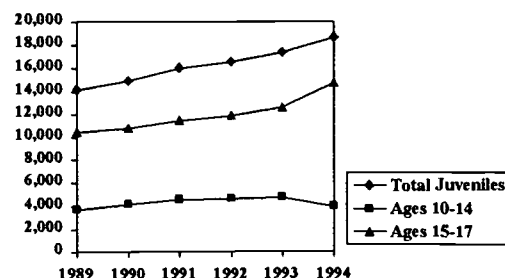
While the teen arrest rate is concerned with juvenile arrests, knowledge about this group of children is not complete without information regarding the outcomes for these youths. "At arrest, a decision is made either to send the matter further into the justice system or to divert the case out of the system, often into alternative programs....Nationally, thirty percent of all juveniles arrested in 1992 were handled within the police department and then released. Two-thirds of arrested juveniles were referred to juvenile court." (*Juvenile Offenders and Victims*, p76)

What About Arkansas?

The total number of arrests of juveniles continues to increase. The average annual growth rate for adult arrests from 1989 to 1994 was 5.8 percent compared with 4.3 percent for juveniles. Juvenile property crime arrests had an annual average growth rate of 1.9 percent, while the annual average growth rate for violent crime arrests was 13.4 percent for the same period, 1989-1994.

In 1994, 16,230 offenses committed by juveniles were adjudicated in juvenile court; total juvenile arrests were 18,737; approximately 86.6 percent of all juvenile arrests were adjudicated.

Teen Violent Death Rate (Ages 15-17)

Definition: The teen violent death rate is the number of deaths from causes other than illness, primarily homicide, suicide, or motor vehicle accidents, among teens ages 15-17 per 100,000 youth.

Nationally, "the teen violent death rate reflects deaths from homicide, suicide, and accidents among those 15-19 years old. Perceptions of increasing violence in our country highlight the implications of this indicator. The growth of gangs in many inner-city areas, coupled with the increased availability of guns, has resulted in a steady growth in teen violent deaths. Declines in teen deaths due to accidents (primarily automobile accidents) were offset by a doubling in the number of homicides. Suicides stayed about the same."

"Many researchers point to the increase in handguns as an important cause of the rise of teen violent deaths. **Every two hours in America today, a child dies of a gunshot wound.** Between 1979 and 1991, there were nearly 40,000 15-19 year olds who died from firearms." (1995 Kids Count Data Book, The Annie E. Casey Foundation, p14)

The average hospital bill for treating a child wounded by a gun is \$14,434 - enough money for a year of college.

"In 1992, 11,383 teens died a violent death. Nationally, the teen violent death rate increased 6% between 1985 and 1992. However, the teen violent death rate actually rose by more than 30% in four states and the District of Columbia." (1995 Kids Count Data Book, The Annie E. Casey Foundation, p14)

The incidence of homicide and violence generally are indicators of "delinquent behavior, hostility, and anger," often resulting from feelings of isolation, alienation, and hopelessness. "It is also a reflection of access to firearms and an indicator of community safety. The incidence of suicide is an indicator of stress, mental health, and community and family support. Accidental deaths, or unintentional injuries, are indicators of children's health and risk-taking behaviors, especially among older adolescents. Unintentional injuries

are also a measure of a broad range of public health and accident prevention strategies including public education, product development and use, (e.g. bike helmets, safety belts, smoke detectors, etc.) and risk reduction and treatment sources (e.g. treatment and prevention of substance abuse and use, poison control centers, and recreation options)." (*The State of the Child in Pennsylvania: A 1995 Kids Count Fact Book*, Pennsylvania Kids Count Partnership, p9)

What About Arkansas?

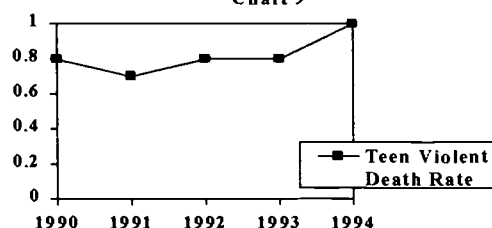
In 1994, the No. 1 killer of 15-17 year olds was death from accidents, the No. 2 cause of death for this age group was homicide, and the No. 3 cause of death was suicide.

The No. 1 killer of 15-19 year olds in 1993 was also from accidents. This represented 44 percent of all deaths. The most likely victims were white males, then white females.

The No. 2 killer of this age group was death from homicide. There were 32 deaths during 1993. Black males were the victims in 81 percent (26) of the deaths. Homicides represented 20 percent of all external causes of death.

The No. 3 killer of young people was death by suicide. This cause of death represented 17 percent of all deaths. More white males, then white females, died from this cause. There have been no suicides of black females. Guns were used in approximately 90 percent of the suicides.

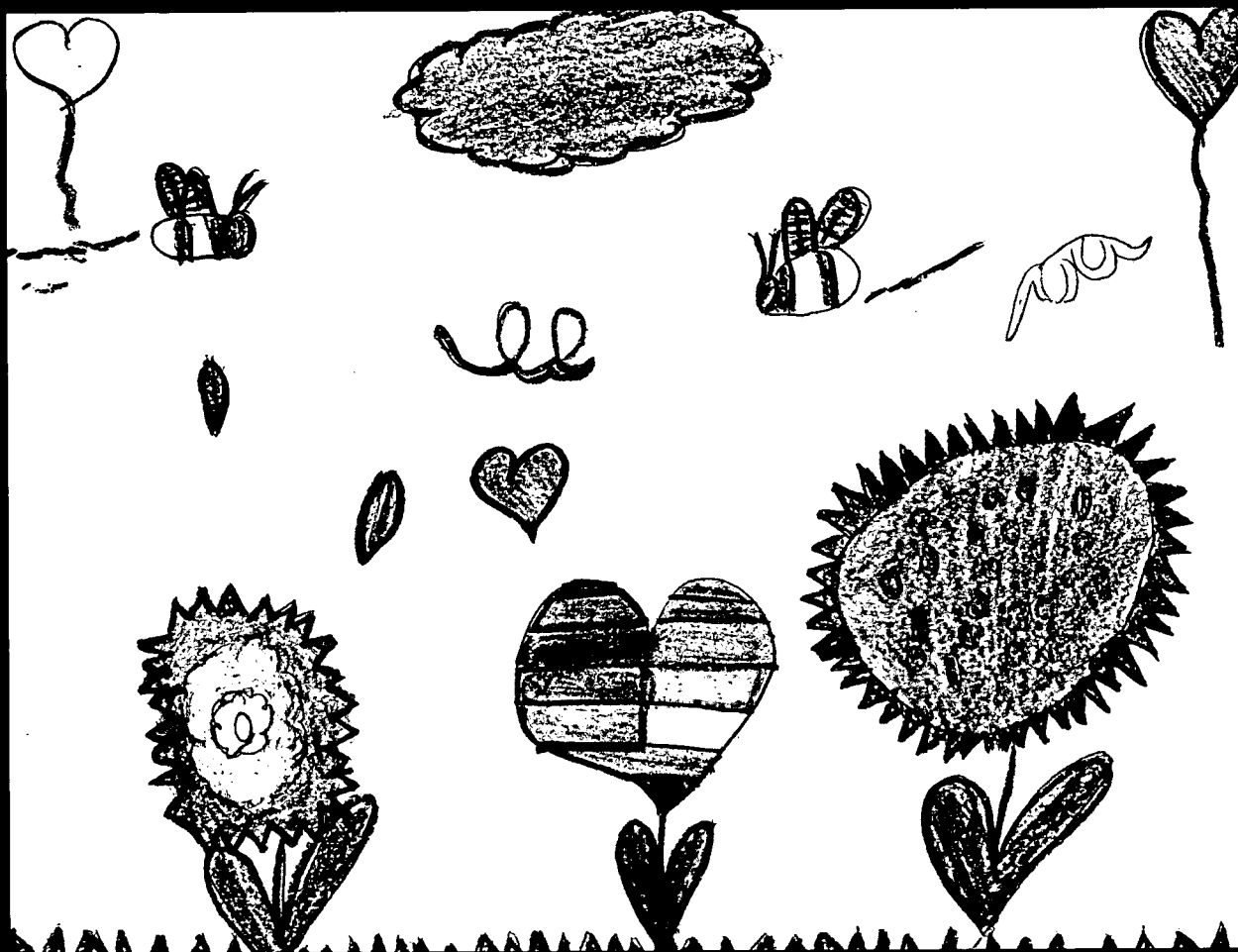

Children in Foster Care: the asterisk (*) in State Fiscal Year 1990, 1991, 1992, 1993 and 1994 in the State Profile and each County Profile indicates the lack of comparability of the data between those years and 1995.

Per Pupil Expenditures: the asterisk (*) in School Year 93/94 indicates that the Per Pupil Expenditure number for the County Profiles has been computed by averaging a Per Pupil Expenditure for each county, using the Per Pupil Expenditure number provided by each school district, which gives the number on each County Profile. The Per Pupil Expenditure number for each district is self-reported and has not been calculated by the Arkansas Department of Education.

High School Dropout Rate: the asterisk (*) in School Year 93/94 indicates that the information is self-reported by each school district and has not been computed by the Arkansas Department of Education.

Demographic Profile

TOTAL POPULATION: the total number of people residing in a specific area as enumerated by the decennial census on April 1. A geographic area may be a city, township, county, state, nation, census tract, block group, or block.

POPULATION UNDER 18: the total number of people between the ages of one day and eighteen years as of April 1 of the census year.

MINORITY POPULATION UNDER 18: the number of people between the ages of one day and eighteen years as of April 1 of the census year who are black; Asian or Pacific Islander; American Indian, Eskimo, or Aleutian; or any other unspecified race (not Hispanic, since Hispanics may be of any race).

The 1990 population counts used in the Children's Data Book do not match those published in the 1990 Census of Population and Housing reports and tape files. The population has been 'modified' by age, race, sex, and Hispanic origin to meet the needs of many data users, especially those involved in population estimate and projection work.

A review of the detailed 1990 information indicated that respondents tended to provide their age as of the date of completion of the questionnaire, not their age as of April 1, 1990. In addition, there may have been a tendency for respondents to round up their ages if they were close to having birthdays. It is likely that approximately ten percent of persons in most age groups are actually one year younger. For most single years of age, the misstatements are largely offsetting. The problem is most pronounced at age zero because persons lost to age one may not have been fully offset by the inclusion of babies born after April 1, 1990, and because there may have been more rounding up to age one to avoid reporting age as 'zero years'. Age in completed months was not collected for infants under age one. Therefore, the age data from the 1990 Census were adjusted to correspond with the April 1, 1990 census date.

In addition, 9.8 million respondents nationwide reported their race as 'Other' on the Census questionnaire and were not included in one of the fifteen racial categories listed on the form. In order to serve the needs of the user community, it was necessary to assign each of these persons to a specified race, and thus the race statistics were modified to be consistent with the classification used in data sets other than census.

The percent of children in poverty was the sum of children below the poverty level divided by the total number of all children in families.
