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ABSTRACT

This report was prepared to provide a comprehensive summary of permanent residence and place of class attendance statistics for calendar year 1998 for Nova Southeastern University, Florida. Data were gained from the University's Student Information System. In 1998, 73% of all students were permanent residents of Florida, and 42% were permanent residents of the tri-county South Florida area (Broward, Miami-Dade, and Palm Beach counties). Thirty-one percent were permanent residents of other Florida counties, and 27% of all students were permanent residents of other states or countries. Eighty-two percent of all students attended class in Florida, with 68 % in the tri-county area. Fourteen percent attended class in other Florida counties. Eighteen percent attended class in another state or at an unidentified location. Four percent attended class at international locations. Data are presented in nine tables. (SLD)

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In an effort to support the University's planning process, Research and Planning regularly reports on a variety of enrollment statistics. In addition to term-related enrollment statistics reported in the Weekly Enrollment Report and annual Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) surveys, Research and Planning has also published calendar year enrollment statistics on place of class attendance and permanent residence. These enrollment statistics are updated yearly in the University's Fact Book.

This report was prepared to provide a comprehensive summary of permanent residence and place of class attendance statistics for Calendar Year 1998 (January 1, 1998 to December 31, 1998). This summary offers far more detail than Research and Planning can publish within the limited space availability of the yearly Fact Book. Data were gained from a series of queries to the University's Student Information System.

Regarding the permanent residence of Nova Southeastern University students during Calendar Year 1998:

- 73 percent of all students were permanent residents of Florida
 - 42 percent were permanent residents of the tri-county South Florida area
 - Broward County 24 percent
 - Miami-Dade County 13 percent
 - Palm Beach County 5 percent
 - 31 percent were permanent residents of other Florida counties
- 27 percent of all students were permanent residents of other states or other countries

Regarding the place of class attendance of Nova Southeastern University students during Calendar Year 1998:

- 82 percent of all students attended class in Florida
 - 68 percent attended class in the tri-county South Florida area
 - Broward County 56 percent

- Miami-Dade County 9 percent
- Palm Beach County 3 percent
- 14 percent attended class in other Florida counties
- 18 percent of all students attended class in another state or at an international location
 - 14 percent attended class in other states or at an unidentified location
 - 4 percent attended class at international locations

There has been minimal percentage change from Calendar Years 1997 to 1998 in terms of place of class attendance.

Overall, the University has experienced a 21 percent increase in calendar year enrollment from Calendar Year 1994 (CY 1994 N = 20,861 students) to Calendar Year 1998 (CY 1998 N = 25,143). Although the Florida-based residence statistic remained stable from Calendar Years 1997 to 1998, there has been a noticeable shift in the representation of South Florida and Other Florida permanent residence. In one calendar year (Calendar 1997 to Calendar Year 1998):

- There were 2,162 fewer permanent residents from Broward, Miami-Dade, and/or Palm Beach counties.
- However, this statistic has been offset by an increase of 2,229 permanent residents from other Florida counties.

Attention to these enrollment statistics is essential if the University is to maintain a focus on the overall Strategic Plan and the concept of optimal sizing. As the University builds a new Library and Information Technology Center, it is essential that the University consider the long-term outcomes of any future shifts in place of class attendance and permanent residence statistics. Currently, there seems to be a fairly large increase in the number of Florida residents from areas other than South Florida coming to the University to attend class (especially in the Health Professions Division). This type of change must be anticipated for the University to continue to develop a learning infrastructure that meets the needs of both campus-based as well as distance education students.

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BACKGROUND

In an effort to provide useful information that supports the University's planning process (*Strategic Plan: 1999 - 2004*, 1999), Research and Planning has recently published calendar year enrollment statistics on place of class attendance (*Place of Class Attendance at Nova Southeastern University: Calendar Years 1990 to 1994*, 1996) and permanent residence (*Permanent Residence of Nova Southeastern University Students: End of Fall Term 1994*, 1995). Research and Planning also regularly prepares term-related enrollment statistics reported in the Weekly Enrollment Report and annual Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) surveys. Updated enrollment statistics are published yearly in the University's Fact Book.

This report was prepared to provide a comprehensive summary of permanent residence and place of class attendance statistics for Calendar Year 1998 (January 1, 1998 to December 31, 1998). This summary report offers far more detail than what Research and Planning can publish within the limited space availability of the yearly Fact Book.

METHODOLOGY

The University's Computing Center was asked to prepare the extract file used for this report on Calendar Year 1998 (January 1, 1998 to December 31, 1998) enrollment statistics during late-November 1998 (memorandum from Tom MacFarland to Mary Harward; November 25, 1998). Although the extract file was prepared on December 22, 1998, it is highly unlikely that any significant additions to the data set occurred during the last week of December 1998. SPSS-X™ was used to conduct the many separate breakout analyses associated with this study of Calendar Year 1998 enrollment statistics.

RESULTS

A set of tables on the permanent residence and place of class attendance for Calendar Year 1998 is attached to this report (Table 1.A to Table 3). These tables offer greater detail than Research and Planning was able to publish in the *Nova Southeastern University Fact Book* (1999):

Regarding the permanent residence of Nova Southeastern University students during Calendar Year 1998:

- 73 percent of all students were permanent residents of Florida
 - 42 percent were permanent residents of the tri-county South Florida area
 - Broward County 24 percent
 - Miami-Dade County 13 percent
 - Palm Beach County 5 percent
 - 31 percent were permanent residents of other Florida counties
- 27 percent of all students were permanent residents of other states or other countries

Although the Florida-based residence statistic remained stable from Calendar Years 1997 to 1998, there has been a noticeable shift in the representation of South Florida and Other Florida permanent residence. In one calendar year (Calendar 1997 to Calendar Year 1998):

There has been minimal percentage change from Calendar Years 1997 to 1998 in terms of place of class attendance.

SUMMARY

The University has experienced a 21 percent increase in calendar year enrollment from Calendar Year 1994 (CY 1994 N = 20,861 students) to Calendar Year 1998 (CY 1998 N = 25,143). However, as presented in Figure 1, there is a wide degree of variance in this growth on an annual basis:

Consistently, approximately 73 percent of all students at the University are Florida residents and approximately 82 percent of all class attendance occurs throughout Florida, with slightly over two-thirds of all class attendance occurring specifically in South Florida. Attention to these enrollment statistics is essential if the University is to maintain a focus on the overall Strategic Plan and the concept of optimal sizing.

As the University builds a new Library and Information Technology Center, it is essential that the University consider the long-term outcomes of any future shifts in place of class attendance and

permanent residence statistics. Currently, there seems to be a fairly large increase in the number of Florida residents from areas other than South Florida coming to the University to attend class (especially in the Health Professions Division). This type of change must be anticipated for the University to continue to develop a learning infrastructure that meets the needs of both campus-based as well as distance education students.

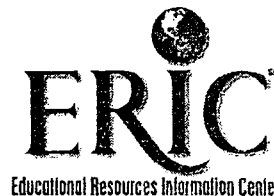
